BISHOP ON PROHIBITION INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

DR. BIDWELL'S DELIVERANCE WILL ATTRACT ATTENTION.

The Lane of Action of the Ontario Government is Highly Commended—Let the People, Speak.

The charge to the synod at Kingston by the Right Rev. E. J. Bidwell includes an important deliverance on the temperance question—a deliverance which will attract much attention throughout the province. The prohibition as a war measure, necessitated by the special circumstances of the time. "As a war measure this action received the approval of the large majority of the people. The question now to be decided is what shall be the permanent law of the province. The government are to be highly commended for their statesmanlike and constructive policy in the line of action upon which they have determined. The referendum to be submitted to the people, as is only just and fair, gives to all an opportunity of expressing their opinions. It includes those who, while supporting prohibition and strongly opposed to the return of the saloon and bar, are not convinced that absolute legal prohibition of every kind of alcoholic beverage is, in normal times, the best method of securing the object in view."

The Bishop of Ontario is not convinced that prohibition prohibits. He feels that under existing conditions a privileged few are able to indulge in liquors while others are not in a financial position to do so. He would like to see what he calls an unjust discrimination removed. He suggests the sale of light beers and wines as a means not only of placing all citizens on an equal footing, but also as a means of providing a comparatively light beverage for those who now indulge in illegal decoctions of the worst possible character. Many people will fervently condemn this expression of opinion, but the time has come when the issue must be fought to a finish. The more open the discussion from now onwards the more conclusive will be the referendum then to be taken.

His Lordship is undoubtedly right in commending the course of the government in arranging for a popular vote. The questions placed on the ballot paper show that Sir William Hearst is intent upon securing the clearest possible mandate from the people as a whole. This is surely the only democratic way of settling a vital issue. The question of regulating the liquor traffic is in the hands of the electors. Every shade of opinion can be registered without fear of confusion. Whatever policy is endorsed by the voters, the premier is pledged to implement it by legislation. His past record shows that he will keep his promise. The out-and-out prohibitionists have equality of opportunity with the beer and wine advocates to express their views. The side which loses in the contest to the people will have no occasion for complaint against the administration, and no political small practice will be possible.

DIED OF INFLUENZA.

Signaller Harold J. Farrar Passed Away in England.

Word was received in the city on Friday that Signaller Harold J. Farrar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Farrar, 11 Crescent Place, Toronto, had passed away in England after severe attack of influenza. Signaller Farrar enlisted in Kingston three years ago with the 12th and Battery after he had completed his senior matriculation work with honors at Kingston Collegiate Institute. In the institution he was considered one of the cleverest students and also took considerable interest in sport. He was a skillful debater and spoke for his school in Kingston and Ottawa against representatives of the Ottawa Collegiate Institute, winning on both occasions. When he arrived in England he was transferred to the signal section of the 1st Heavy Battery as he was especially qualified for the work, having been the owner of the first wireless set in Kingston. About a year ago he was severely gassed but was returned to his unit and was able to carry on until the armistice was signed. No particulars of his latest illness have yet been received. Before leaving for overseas Signaller Farrar was a prominent young man in church work at St. James' church and intended to enter the Anglican ministry on his return. The deepest sympathy of many friends in the city will go out to Mr. Farrar, formerly superintendent of the Canadian Locomotive Company, Mrs. Farrar and the deceased's sister, Miss Phyllis Farrar.

J. T. LeFever Promoted.

On the tenth anniversary of his arrival in Kingston John T. LeFever, local manager of the Prudential Life Insurance Company, received word on Thursday of his promotion to the position of superintendent of the Dover, New Hampshire, district for the company. It was on June 5th, 1909, that Mr. LeFever came to the city to organize the work of the company, and through hard work on his part some seventeen thousand policies have been issued. His promotion is well merited and success is assured in his new field. His successor will be Frederick Clayton, Regina, who started in Kingston in 1910 as an agent, and who will return as superintendent of the district.

County Rate Ten Mills.

The county council committee were in session all Friday morning. The finance committee presented the budget on Friday afternoon, and recommended a tax rate of ten mills. This is the same total rate as last year, but without last year's war tax. It means an increase of one mill for roads and general purposes. The committee did not recommend any increased grants to charities or any grants to organizations for military purposes.
