TO CONTROL FISH PRICES

Ontario Government Will Protect the Public This Season. Toronto, June 6.—Extra precautions are being taken this season by the Sales Branch of the Ontario Fisheries Department to insure the consumers' interests being protected, in carrying out its policy of making freshwater fish available to the largest number of the people of the Province at a low price. While Ontario Government fish were last year sold at a price fixed by the department, reports reached officials from time to time that some unscrupulous dealers were disposing of the Government article at a higher price than was intended by the Government. It is to put a stop to this practice that the Government this year is requiring that each dealer, before he can purchase fish from the Government shall sign a contract, under which he agrees that, insofar as the white and trout varieties are concerned, he will handle only the Government article. These contracts became effective about a week ago, and they are for the duration of the navigation season, thus expiring about the end of November. They only limit the dealer in his sale of the two varieties mentioned. He is permitted to buy all other kinds of fish wherever he will, and sell them at whatever price he chooses. ONE HOUR A DAY FOR GOVERNMENT How Germany Would Utilize Its 21,000,000 Workers For Nine Hours.

Berlin, June 6.—Dr. Bernhard Dernburg, the minister of finance, has evolved a plan to raise for the government seven billion marks a year by means of a "government working hour," according to the Neue Zeitung. The plan will become a law, it is added, if the government is convinced that it is workable. Herr Dernburg's scheme provides that each worker in Germany shall labor an extra hour each day, for which the employers will pay a proportionate wage, plus one mark overtime. The extra mark will go to the government. Dernburg estimates that there are 21,000,000 workers, and that the plan will bring in more than 7,000,000,000 marks a year. The only objection to the plan, it is said, is that the cabinet may decide that it violates the eight-hour day, with which the government has gained much popularity.

CHRISTIANITY THEATRE.

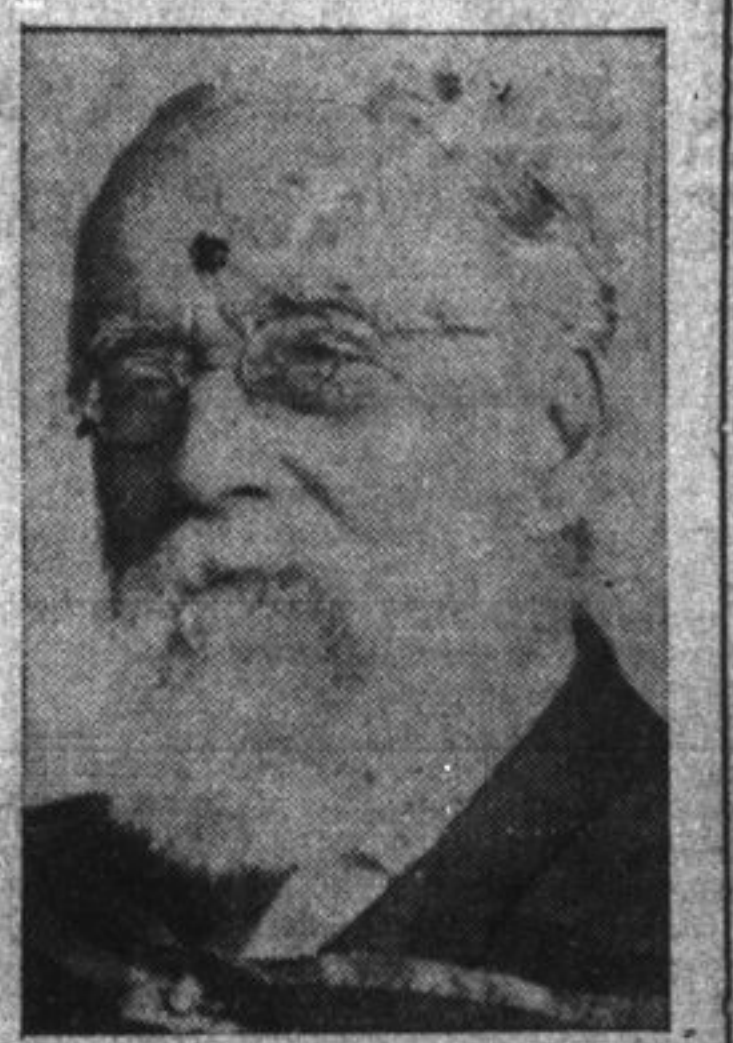
Playhouse in Connection With Church Proposed. London, June 6.—The establishment of a theatre in London exclusively for the Christian Church through which the message now given from the pulpit might be amplified, has been advocated by the Rev. R. R. L. Sheppard, vicar of St. Martin-in-the-Fields. He said the theatre was essential to the welfare of the people, especially those in such places as east London. They like good things; they did not any more than himself, want bedroom scenes—not because they or he were shocked by them, but because such scenes were an insult to their intelligence. He was convinced, he said, that the chief reason why the church did not count as it ought to was that its leadership had not the courage to realize that such a venture as the proposed was absolutely essential for the welfare of Christianity in England.

A VOSGES TUNNEL

Superior Council of Alsace and Lorraine Meets. Strasbourg, June 6.—The superior council of Alsace and Lorraine held its first meeting under the new French regime on Monday in the building formerly occupied by the German ministry of the interior of Alsace and Lorraine. Alexandre Millerand, the governor-general, in a speech in which he paid tribute to the people of Alsace and Lorraine, said that no abrupt change in the laws of the two provinces was contemplated. The University of Strasbourg was important in the cultural life of the people, the Governor-General asserted, and would need a large appropriation from the French Government. The question of driving a tunnel through the Vosges Mountains, he added, would be taken into consideration. France, he concluded, would do her best to justify recovered provinces.
