THREE ATHLETIC MEETINGS INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

MILITARY AND CITY LEAGUES MET FRIDAY EVENING.

Senior Schedule For City League Will Be Drawn Up—Ponies Have Entered the League.

The constitution of the City League was radically changed at a meeting of the board of management on Friday evening, with Bert Booth presiding. There was a full attendance of the executive, including P. J. Moran, Dr. F. J. O'Connor, Dr. L. J. Walsh, Hugh Shanahan and H. J. Hartrick. It was reported that everything was set for the junior game on Saturday between Red Sox and Y.I.C.E.A. The former is composed of boys attending the K.C.I. and both teams are in first class condition. Announcement was also made that a senior schedule would be drawn up the first part of next week, Athletics, Red Sox and Ponies being entered for the season. It was decided that the membership fee for the association should be one dollar. A canvass of those interested in sport will be made and it is hoped that enough money will be collected to put amateur sport in the city on a firm foundation.

Military Baseball League.

At a meeting of the Military Baseball League on Friday evening it was decided that the game between G.W. V.A. and Vocational Training School played last Saturday, should be replayed to-day. Notice was received that Science Summer School had dropped out of the league and its place will be taken by the R.C.H.A. Decision was also made to divide any proceeds received from the games between the teams at the end of every month.

Military Football League.

It was decided at a meeting of the Military Football League on Friday evening to reopen the entry list for a few days to permit another team to enter the league. It was also decided that the schedule would begin next Saturday. F. Ingledew will referee the game between Collingwood Shipbuilders and Vocational Training School, and Brig-Gen. V. A. S. Williams, G.O.C., will be requested to kick off the ball. A deputation consisting of E. Clark, R. McCullough and G. A. Adam will seek donations from business men for the support of the league and the parks committee will be requested to grant permission for the use of the cricket field to the club for two evenings and one afternoon each week.

THE KINGSTON GOLF CLUB DECIDED FRIDAY NIGHT TO ERECT CLUB HOUSE.

Committee Will Bring in Fall Report As to Site and Means of Financing Scheme—Arrangements Have Been Made For Supply of Water To the Greens.

An enthusiastic meeting of the Kingston Golf and Country Club was held on Friday night in the Board of Trade rooms. A. B. Cunningham was in the chair.

By unanimous vote, the meeting decided to proceed with the erection of a club house. Discussion followed as to the location of the club house, and opinion was pretty evenly divided as to whether it should be erected on the north or the south side of King street.

By vote, the president was authorized to appoint a committee of seven to give a full report on the matter, including ways and means of financing the scheme. The names of the committee will be announced later, and it is expected that the report will be ready for presentation at another meeting of the club to be held in two or three weeks.

Arrangements were made for a supply of water to the greens, and it is expected that water will be on the greens in the course of three weeks. At the present time the club is playing eight holes, but in three weeks' time it is expected nine holes will be completed and ready for play. It was explained to the members that out-of-town visitors could be put up at the greens by the members and the following green fees: 50 cents a day, \$2 a week, or \$9 a month.

ONE MAN IS KILLED AND ANOTHER INJURED

They Were Struck by Lightning in a Storm at Enterprise.

Word was received in the city Saturday morning that Edward Ellis, about 45 years of age, a farmer residing north of Enterprise, was struck by lightning and killed at Enterprise Friday night while attending a church service.

Allan Carscallen was also struck by lightning and badly injured.

It is stated that the storm around Enterprise was one of the most severe experienced in many years.
