### G.W.V.A. OFFICIAL VISITS KINGSTON

(Continued from Page 1.)  
 G.W.V.A. advisory committee amounts to an official recognition of the association, and is largely due to the fact that the majority of the twenty soldier members of parliament are also members of the G.W.V.A.

While in Kingston Mr. Jarvis interviewed practically all the citizens who were in any way connected with the work of re-establishment. He had a long conference with the representative of the Board of Pensions commissioners and with the

medical officer in that office, and was well pleased with the way the matter affecting pensions were being handled in this district. He also interviewed Prof. Manly Baker, the District Vocational Officer, and discussed the new order-in-council regarding vocational training for boys who enlisted under the age of eighteen. He had a special word of praise for the Information and Service Branch in Kingston, which is under the charge of W. G. Bailey, and for the Employment office, which is carried on by A. Tugwood. He says that the service rendered by these two branches in Kingston has been remarkable, and has done much to prevent any unemployment problem in Kingston. He stated that he was so struck by the work being done by Mr. Tugwood that he intends to make it the subject of a special report and congratulation to the repatriation department at Ottawa.

Mr. Jarvis also interviewed General Williams and other repatriation officials, and found them all very sympathetic and anxious to help along the work of reconstruction. He then interviewed the Mayor and several of the aldermen of Kingston, and tried to impress upon them the necessity of helping returned men to find employment. He told them that the government looked to the municipalities to assist in this way during the period of demobilization, as it was only by the concerted efforts of the provincial and federal governments and the municipalities as well as of individual employers that it can be carried on to a satisfactory conclusion.

He said that the labour bureaus started by the Ontario government have been a great success, and that when all the private employment agencies have been closed they will be of even greater value. They are at present giving very efficient service all over the province, and are helping considerably to solve the employment problem. He stated that the Dominion Executive of the G.W.V.A. had offered to act as mediators in the strike at Winnipeg, in the hope that they might be able to arrange a satisfactory settlement, but that so far no reply had been received to that offer.

Mr. Jarvis is to be in the city until Monday evening, when he is to address the Kingston branch of the G.W.V.A. and to answer all questions regarding the work of the G.W.V.A. advisory committee.

### NEW INCOME TAX

All Canada will be interested in the federal income tax schedule announced by the minister of finance. These imply a substantial increase over the present tax, but no estimate was given of the expected revenue. There is a normal rate of four per cent upon all incomes between \$1,000 and \$2,000 for unmarried persons, and widows or widowers with or without dependent children, and between \$2,000 and \$5,000 in the case of all other persons. There will be a rate of eight per cent upon all incomes above \$5,000 and a graduated surtax commencing with incomes of \$5,000 instead of \$6,000 as heretofore. The finance minister gave the following table to illustrate the present and proposed taxation on all incomes from \$3,000 to \$1,000,000 and over for married persons, and widows and widowers having dependent children:

### LAW HAS BEEN PASSED TO DEPORT PERSONS

Who by Word or Act Advocate Overthrow of Government.

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
 Ottawa, June 7.—Parliament unanimously passed a bill in record time, giving the government power to deport all persons who by word or act advocate the overthrow of the government of Great Britain or Canada.

The Senate last night killed the Mowat amendment to the power clause in the Consolidated Railway Bill.

The anti-Japanese boycott which is being fostered by the national students organization in Peking, is spreading throughout China. The authorities are unable to check the movement and the minister of education and the vice minister have resigned.

The Greater Berlin Soviet has adopted a twenty-four hour general strike, in protest against the execution at Munich on Thursday of Levin Nissen, the Bavarian Communist leader.
