SATURDAY'S MARKET.

Vegetables At Reasonable Prices—

Meat Prices Higher. The fine weather brought out large crowds of farmers, market gardeners and shoppers on Saturday morning. Prices were lower for most fresh commodities, especially for vegetables. Eggs and butter were little changed in price, the former selling at 54 and 56 cents a dozen, and the latter at 55 and 60 cents a pound, with the bulk at the lower figure. Fowls were plentiful, and sold at prices varying from \$1.00 to \$2.50 each.

In the meat section supplies were only fair, and prices were a little higher than usual. Veal sold at 15 to 18 cents a pound for loins and 24 and 25 cents a pound for hind-quarters of pork sold at 31 cents a pound, and hind-quarters at 33 cents. There was a small supply of mutton, which sold at 20 cents for fore-quarters and 35 cents a pound for hind-quarters. Live hens, big white Wyandottes sold at \$2.00 each. One farmer was selling pet rabbits at \$1 and upwards a pair, and pigeons at the same price, and they met with a quick sale.

In the vegetable section there was no scarcity of supplies. Rhubarb was especially plentiful, and sold at three bunches for a quarter. Lettuce, fresh and green, went at two and three bunches for a quarter. Green onions were much cheaper, being four bunches for a quarter, and radishes sold at the same figure. A few cabbages were on sale at 5 and 10 cents each. Seed potatoes were also on sale at \$1.75 a bag. For the first time in many weeks, there was a good supply of apples on the market, these selling at 60 cents a peck. Plants for setting out were plentiful, as were flowers in pots and cut flowers, and they met with a ready sale.

DEPEND THE STATE

From the Inevitable Revenge of Prussian Militarism. (Canadian Press Dispatch) Cologne, June 7.—Dr. Dorten, president of the new Rhenish republic, has telegraphed Sir William Robertson, commander of the British forces of organization here, announcing the formation of a republic and repudiating any desire to evade a just share in the reparation of war damages. He appeals to the Entente Powers to protect the new state against inevitable revenge from Prussian militarism.

They Cannot Pay.

London, June 7.—In an interview Germany's inability to meet the financial demands of the peace terms and the inability of the Allies to make her pay are insisted upon by Dr. Bernhard Dernburg, German minister of finance. Dr. Dernburg speaks decisively of President Wilson: "I thought he came over here as a new sort of redeemer, in the role of a saviour of mankind, but I have not found in the peace treaty one word of his peace or conciliation and good-will."

Vote Against Daylight Bill. Washington, June 7.—Favorable report on the bill to repeal the daylight saving law on the last Sunday in October was voted yesterday by the House Interstate Commerce Commission.

Mrs. Mary Knight, Bridgeburg, waded into the river and rescued a five-year-old boy. A credit of ten million dollars in favor of Italy, was announced by the United States treasury. Mrs. Thos. Barnes, Brantford, is trying to locate her husband, a discharged soldier. Four of the largest Brantford factories have adopted a shorter work day.

Military News

ad military Captain Williams, late quartermaster C.A.M.C. training depot, now demobilized, has been appointed to the Department Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment.

Major Thompson, A.D.M.S. Sanitation, has resigned and returned to the practice of his profession, and the position has been abolished.

Lieut. Gilmour, late 2nd Battalion C.E.F., has been appointed to the records office, M. D. No. 3.

Major C. Scott, Records Officer for Eastern Canada, leaves on Monday on a tour of inspection, and will visit St. John and Halifax.

The crosses for the soldiers' graves are about completed for the graves at Catarqui and St. Mary's cemeteries. Arrangements have been made to have the plots put in order and sodded, and the crosses placed in position.

The rifle range at Barriefield opened to-day, and the Kingston Rifle Association had its first shoot.

Two officers and three men from the Mauretania are expected to reach Kingston Sunday.

The men from the SS. Empress of Russia, who were held under quarantine at Vancouver, are now on their way to Kingston, and are expected to arrive on Tuesday or Wednesday.

Capt. Arthur Whytock, who returned lately from overseas is now attached to Queen's Military Hospital.

The hot weather has been especially hard upon the soldiers who are convalescing in local military hospitals and several have been heard to complain of an empty rear seat of charity on the part of local motorists. One soldier remarked, "The other night two of us in apoplectic condition stopped for breath on a street-corner and to pass the time we counted the automobiles which passed—no, those which were full but those which had an empty rear seat. In less than fifteen minutes twenty-two such cars passed us on pleasure bent. And then we took a taxi which cost us a dollar bill; and if you are mathematically inclined you can work out in decimals just what proportion that sum bears to one dollar ten."

LIEUT.-COL. BELL RESIGNS.

Disagrees With Medical Organization of Re-establishment.

Lieut.-Col. F. McKelvey Bell, Director of Medical Services for the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, yesterday forwarded his resignation to Senator Lougheed. Col. Bell in his letter says that his ideas of medical organization have been at variance with the system instituted by the late Military Hospital Commission, and much of which has been contained in a department of Soldiers' Re-establishment that medical branch has been made secondary in importance to almost every other branch of the organization.

Col. Bell also states that many important recommendations he made have never been acceded to.
