WATERTOWN JAZZERS MAY REMAIN IN U.S.A.

Musicians' Union Trying to Prevent Entrance of American Orchestra.

It is understood that the local Muicians' Union is making efforts to prevent an American orchestra from Watertown, N.Y., from accepting an be held in the city on June 20th, now located at Teeswater. This orchestra, which made a hit in the city on several occasions during the winter, was to have been engaged for the forthcoming occasion, but representations have been made to the authorities to have them stopped at the border should they attempt a landing.

Alexander Fowler, local immigra-cion inspector, was asked whether the musicians would be permitted to enter, and he stated that under the law, which had been recently in-terpreted, it would be extremely unlikely. The Immigration Act per mits the entrance of members of dramatic, musical, athletic, artistic or spectacular organizations tempor-arily for the exercise of their respective callings, but the Depart-ment of Immigration has issued a ruling that it is a violation of the Dominion Alien Labor Act for such persons to enter unless their profession is their sole means of support. Whether this be so in the case of the Watertewn band is not known, and the local musicians' union is making inquiries.
