THE SENATE AND THE PEOPLE. The rejection by the Senate of Mr. Mowat's amendment to the Railway Act to protect municipalities against the encroachment upon their streets of the public utility corporations, has hastened the day when steps must be taken to do something with the Senate.

The utter uselessness and superfluity of the upper chamber in Canada is becoming more and more apparent. Their chief excuse for existence, that of being the divorce court for Canada, having been taken away from them by W. F. Nickle's Divorce Bill, they are of very little use to the country.

At one of the first meetings of the civic reception the aldermen on that committee favored having a "one big day celebration" for all Kingston's returned soldiers. We hope that they have not forgotten about this, but that they are ready to carry it out.

Further Stringent Orders Have Been Issued by the Militia Department.

The notification states that the sale, gift or delivery of intoxicating liquors to officers or men in uniform is strictly forbidden, except on the authority of a medical officer.
