### WIDENS SCOPE OF FUND

PATRIOTIC MONEY MAY NOW BE DIVERTED.

To Give Relief to the Dependents of Men Who Served During the War—The Fund Has a Considerable Surplus.

A bill has been introduced in the House of Commons by the Hon. Mr. Calder respecting the Canadian Patriotic Fund, which greatly widens the scope of the fund. Interviewed by the Whig on Friday morning, H. C. Nickle stated that the question of post-war relief for discharged soldiers and their dependents was one which had given the authorities a considerable amount of thought, and it had been decided that the Patriotic Fund was only organization which could handle this work. There is a considerable surplus of funds in the hands of this organization, and it can very well be used to give relief, in cases of need, to the dependents of men who have served in the Canadian army or any of the allied armies, as the act provides. This section of the bill which effects the policy of the Patriotic Fund reads as follows:

"The objects of the corporation shall be to receive, collect, administer and distribute the fund for the assistance, in case of need, of the wives, children and dependents, resident in Canada, of officers and men who during the war which began on August 4th, 1914, may be, or may have been engaged on active service with the naval or air forces of His Majesty or His Majesty's allies."

This extends the benefits of the fund to the dependents of soldiers after they have been discharged from the service. A new scale of allowances for such cases, and regulations under which they will be made, is being drawn up, and will be discussed at a meeting of the executive of the fund to be held in Ottawa on June 18th and 19th.

"Cash and Carry" Reduces Cost.  
Ottawa, June 12.—J. A. Leduc, M.P. for Westmount-St. Henry, told the cost of living committee of the Commons yesterday that by conducting a "cash and carry" business and owing to his own abattoir, he was able to sell beef at a reduction of from 30 per cent. to 35 per cent. On other provisions by the "cash and carry" system he was able to sell at from 20 per cent. to 25 per cent. cheaper.

### GARDEN PARTY HELD.

Annual Event at House of Providence a Great Success.  
The annual garden party at the House of Providence under the auspices of the Orphans' Guild for the benefit of the children in the orphanage at St. Mary's-on-the-Lake on Thursday afternoon was a splendid success in every way. Besides the fun provided by several of the tables a twilight concert was a feature of the afternoon's entertainment. Dancing by some of the children, selections by the glee club under the direction of Lee Clark and several recitations by Romeo Blair delighted the very large number present. Rev. Father Nicholson, M.C., made a short address which was enjoyed by all, and during the evening supper was served to over five hundred persons. It is not known yet how much money was realized from the event, but it will be devoted to the purposes of the Orphans' Guild.

### DISTINGUISHED VISITORS.

Three Famous Soldiers and Mayor Church Met by Mayor Newman.

Accompanying Mayor Church were three distinguished soldiers, who will also attend the ball. They were Lieut.-Col. Barker, C. 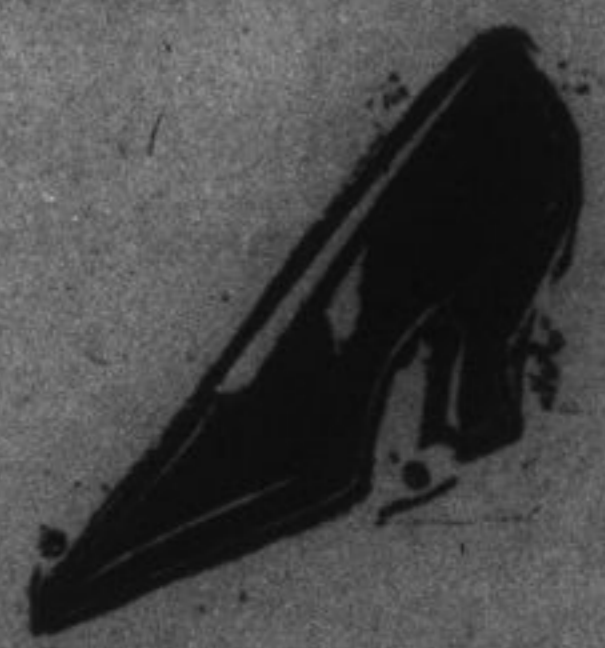
