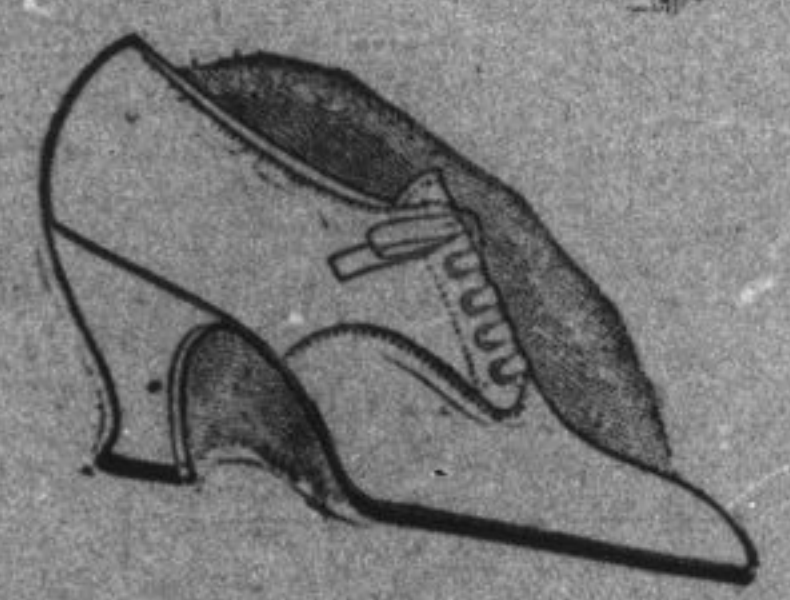
### KINGSTON EVENTS 25 YEARS AGO.

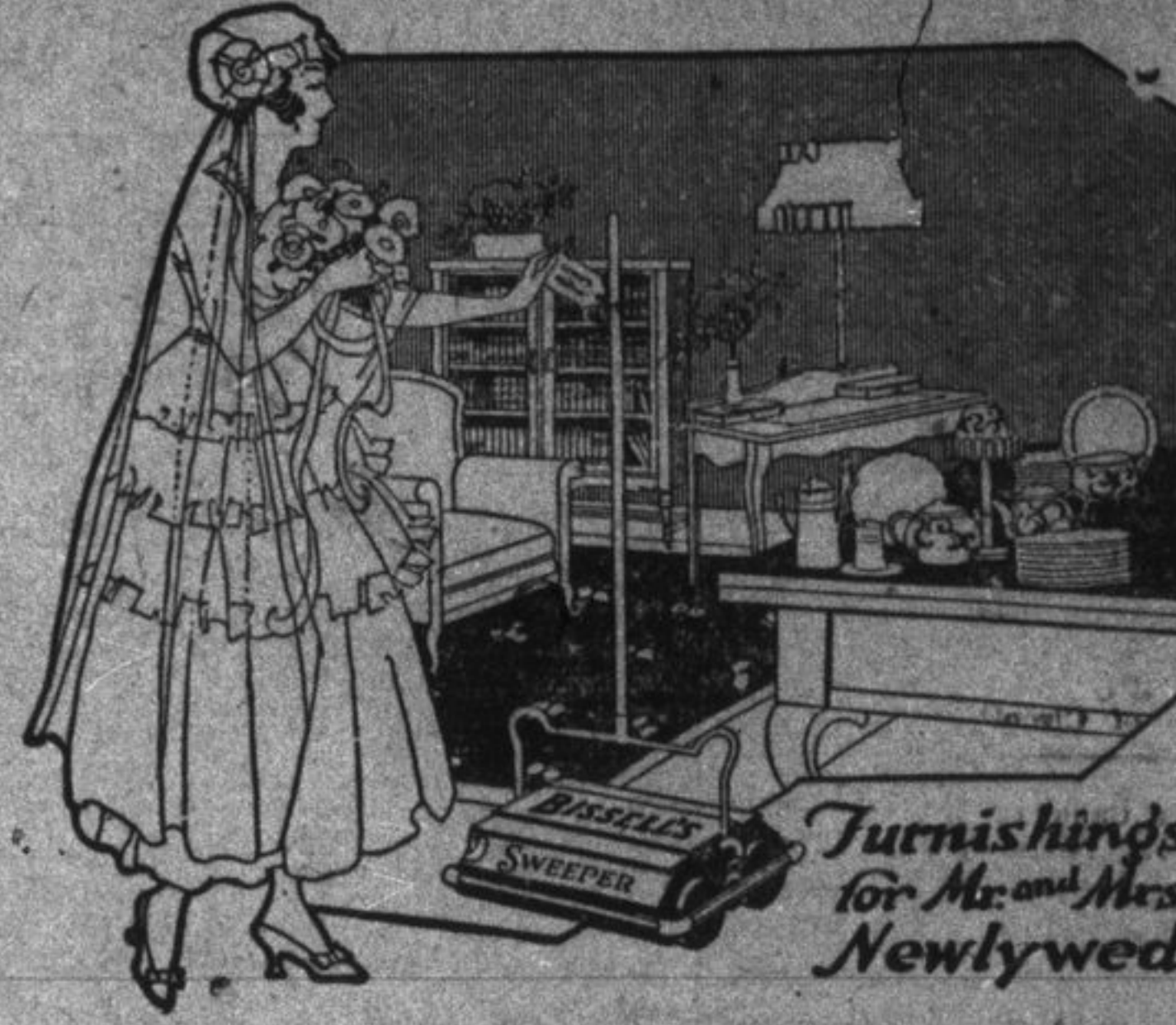
