With regard to settling the Locomotive Workers Strike.

The locomotive works strike situation is now being taken up by the committee appointed by the city council, consisting of J. M. Campbell, Mayor Newman and W. F. Nickle, M.P. Upon Mr. Nickle's arrival from Ottawa on Saturday, a meeting was held and a communication was addressed to the management of the company and to the metal workers federation requesting that representatives be selected to meet the committee with the object of discussing the issue and reaching an agreement.

At a meeting of the Plumbers Union on Saturday night, reports were received respecting the attitude of the bosses towards the demand for an advance of wages to seventy cents per hour, with double time charged in time and a half for overtime, and double time for Sundays. It was reported that all of the shops in the city, except two had agreed to the new schedule, and it was decided that the employees of these two should remain absent from work unless an agreement is reached in the meantime.
