**GOVERNOR'S PARTY MET BY OFFICIALS**  
They Were Received At 10.40 O'clock on Sunday Morning.

**SERVICE OF THANKSGIVING**  
ATTENDED IN ST. GEORGE'S CATHEDRAL AT 11 A.M.

**Bishop Bidwell Was the Preacher—The Cathedral Was Crowded—A Drive About the City in the Afternoon and Tea With W. F. Nickle, M.P.**

His Excellency, the Governor-General arrived in Kingston at 10.40 a.m. on Sunday by special train and was met by Mayor H. W. Newman, W. F. Nickle, M.P.; Lieut.-Col. R. E. Kent, George Wright, N. A. Smith and S. S. Corbett, comprising the finance committee of the city council; Brig.-Gen. Williams, G.O.C. M.D. No. 3; and Brig.-Gen. Perreau, commandant of the Royal Military College. His Excellency was accompanied by the Duchess of Devonshire and his two daughters, Lady Dorothy and Lady Rachel, Miss Eberton, Lord Richard Nevill, Captain Lord Haddington, Captains Miller and Cater, A.D.C's.

The party drove direct to St. George's Cathedral to attend the service of thanksgiving for the safe return of the ex-cadets of the Royal Military College, at the conclusion of which Holy Communion was celebrated. The vice-regal party occupied the front pew on the right and the mayor and aldermen that on the left of the centre aisle. Behind them were representatives of district headquarters, the college staff and the gentlemen cadets. The ex-cadets occupied the right gallery. Among them were Major-General Sir Henry Bursall, K.C.B., commander of the 2nd Canadian Division, who reached Kingston on Saturday; Col. Lamb, C.M.G., who served in the 1st division; Lieut.-Col. D. McPherson, a graduate of 1879; Col. Constantine, D.S.O.; Col. G. Hunter Ogilvie, late A.A.G. M.D. No. 3; Lieut.-Col. Gerald Hanson, Lieut.-Col. W. A. Bishop, V.C., D.S.O., M.C., etc.; Lieut.-Col. Cosgrave, Lieut.-Colonel Gilmore, Lieut.-Colonel James C. Stewart, Major Parr, Mr. Birmingham, Mr. Brigstock, Major E. Bristol, Major H. P. Lafferty, Major William Harty, Major C. F. Carson, R.E.; Major Alexander Patterson, D.S.O.; Captain G. F. Hilliard, Lieut.-Col. C. Caldwell.

The service was conducted by Very Rev. Dean Starr, rector of the cathedral, and opened with the professional hymn, "Holy, Holy Holy, Lord God Almighty." The Epistle was taken from Ephesians vi, 10-18, beginning "Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord," and the Gospel from St. Matt. x, 24-39, the concluding verse of which was, "He that findeth his life shall lose it, and he that loseth his life for my sake shall find it." The hymns were "Fight the good fight with all thy might" and "The Son of God goes forth to war, a kingly crown to gain," the recessional, "O God Our Help in Ages Past," "God Save the King" followed the offertory.

Bishop Bidwell was the preacher. His text was taken from II. Thessalonians, xi, 15, "Therefore, brethren, stand fast, and hold the traditions which ye have been taught, whether by word or our epistle." "It was always human," said the preacher, "to take the line of least resistance, but the traditions of the Christian martyrs show us that the noblest fate that can befall a man was to die in the faith and hand it on to those that come after." He saw this borne out in the conduct of the graduates of the Royal Military College during the great war

that has just closed, which demonstrated the irresistible force of splendid traditions. "The call of the blood came to you and you went forth—sons, brothers, husbands—to those who died or were killed in battle, he declared that they brought imperishable glory to the college, for "no greater honor can any man have than that a man lay down his life for his friend." The cadets had always been true to the traditions. Indeed, it was necessary to restrain the noble impulses of many in their desire to be early at the scene of the service, "Could the most democratic opponent of titles deny honors to such men as these?" asked the speaker. Their record is one of which all may be justly proud. But we can best show our thanksgiving by living up to the important message of this hour: "Go to your fellow men and say that money and position are not the greatest things in life, for what shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" He directed the attention of those yet in college to the great heritage and begged them to stand fast. The message of the service, epitomized, was "obedience to the will of God."

Holy Communion was administered by Dean Starr.

The cathedral was crowded, and many hundreds of people who could not gain entrance lined the streets, during the two hours' service, waiting to get a glimpse of His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, for whatever their views may be respecting titles in general they are intensely loyal to the Crown, and were pleased to see in the person of the Duke of Devonshire a man whose ability and attainments invigorate their fullest confidence, and whose unwavering adherence to British institutions and British justice marked him as the worthy representative of His Majesty in Canada.

The party drove to the Royal Military College for luncheon, and at 3 p.m. returned to the city and met the mayor and aldermen at the City Hall. A drive about the city then took place, and at 4.30 His Excellency had tea at the residence of W. F. Nickle, M.P., later returning to the college, where he was the guest of Brig.-Gen. Perreau.
