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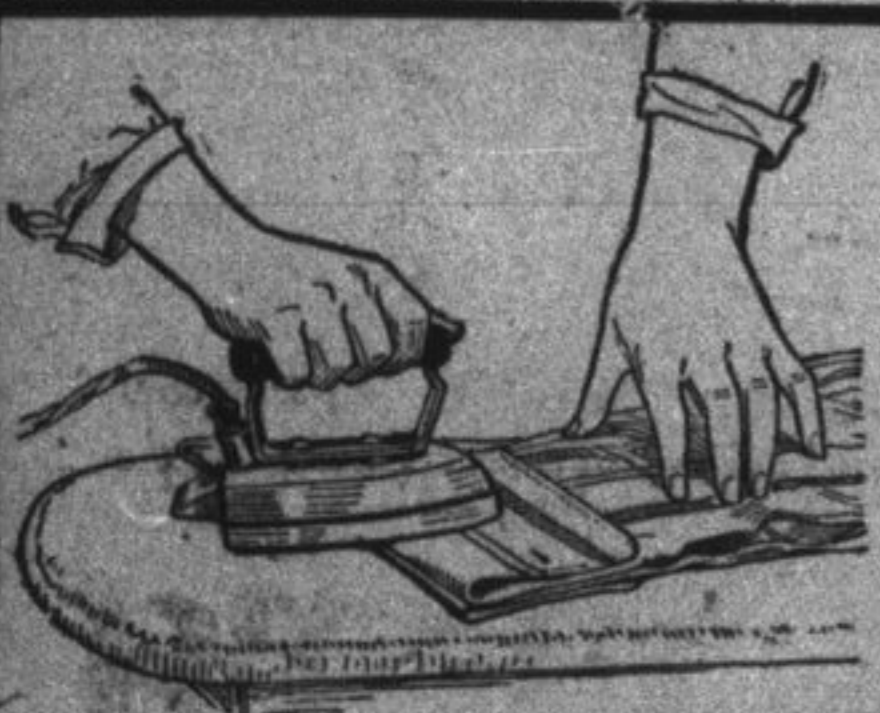
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Threatens Suit.

ATHLETICS BEAT PONIES

IN CITY LEAGUE BASEBALL GAME BY 2 TO 1.

Police Constable Norman Hughes Pitched for the Winners—W. F. Nickle, M.P., Officially Declared the Season Open.

Some fan ventured the opinion before the opening feature of the City Baseball League at the Cricket Field on Saturday afternoon between Ponies and Athletics that Cotman's baseball prime was over but he added as an afterthought, "You've got to count him in the game for a while yet." It sure was a lucky afterthought, for Cotman was the hero of Saturday's fixture when his clotting ability and good baseball sense carried him over the home plate for the only runs that Athletics scored and won the game by 2-1.

A niftier game of baseball could not have been desired and the standard set at the first game augurs well for the future fixtures. The schedule was officially commenced by W. F. Nickle, M.P., who wished the league all success and shipped over a fast one to Ald. Patterson. Instead of permitting Mayor Newman to display his ability as a catcher, the lab-or representative binged one to the outfield and was called safe at first when J. G. Elliott, holding down sack one, placed about six feet between himself and the ball on the throw in.

The game was fast from beginning to end and at times it almost developed into a pitchers' duel. Norman Hughes, one of Chief Nesbitt's copies, made his debut on the mound and held the Ponies down to six hits. He showed good control throughout the game but like Cherry he had to retire near the end under the strain. "Del" was up to regular form and was accorded very good support though some of Ponies' errors must have been disappointing to him. On the whole the teams were well balanced and it was a tight little, right little game all through.

Nicholson started off the season at bat. He was thrown out, N. Hughes to Spoor. Evans walked but died on a steal to second, and Daley lined to Spoor.

Spoor singled, stole second and took third on a muff of Smith. Twigg fouled. Thompson walked and stole second. It looked as if Athletics would notch up the first one but "Del" rose to the occasion and struck out Cotman and McNeill.

In the second sessions Walsh trotted—but was thrown out at second. Gallagher, who was top hitter for the game, singled and managed to slip around to third while Baker was thrown out at first and Smith struck out.

Coyne started off the second for "Buff's" beauties with a single but "Del" tightened up and struck out the next three.

The third saw Cherry line to Spoor. Fitzgerald fan, Nicholson single and Evans breeze.

Spoor flied to Nicholson and Twigg and Thompson struck out.

In the fourth Daley stepped on a batted ball, Walsh fouled and Gallagher singled but the side went out when Baker fanned.

Cotman walked, took second on a bum throw from Hughes but was called at third, when Walsh threw over an infield biff from McNeill. The latter pulled steals to second and third but they were of no use as Coyne popped to Baker and Spencer stizzed out.

Smith started the one-two-three in the fifth for Ponies but Athletics looked dangerous when N. Hughes singled. J. Hughes struck out. Spoor got to first on Smith's error and stole second but the side went out when Twigg hoisted to Nicholson and Thompson whiffed.

In the sixth Nicholson fouled. Evans breezed, and Daley died at second after securing a nice single.

Cotman started the excitement by clouting out one for three sacks to deep right field. McNeill placed the most beautiful hit of the game between short and second, scoring Cotman. "Del's" shirt came on when Coyne lined to first but he tucked it in again when Spencer struck out.

Walsh hoisted to Coyne in the seventh. Gallagher doubled and was thrown out on a steal at third by Cotman. Baker popped Smith.

Spoor was the only one who did anything in the seventh for Athletics when he was able to beat the ball to first on a bunt.

In the eighth Smith started the one-two-three again but Athletics took another run. Thompson lifted to Gallagher. Cotman singled and slipped to second on an overthrow from Evans to Daley. McNeill singled, advancing Cotman. Gallagher replaced Cherry in the box but Coyne touched the apple and scored Cotman. Spencer also nalled it and McNeill died at the home plate, by Gallagher. N. Hughes fanned.

Ponies went into the ninth with "Joe" Daley's instructions for full steam ahead. Nicholson hit a two bagger out to the left field. Evans walked and died at second. Pustell replaced N. Hughes on the mound. Daley hoisted to J. Hughes and Nicholson passed over the plate on McNeill's error. Walsh popped to McNeill and the game ended 2 to 1 for Athletics.

It was a snappy and peppery game, perhaps devoid of spectacular sensations but steady and tight throughout. There was an exceptionally good crowd and the weather conditions were perfect.
