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

Police Constable Norman Hughes Pitched for the Winners—W. F. Nickle, M.P., Officially Declared Athletics-

A niftier game of baseball could not have been desired and the standard set at the first game augurs well for the future fixtures. The schedule was officially commenced by W . Nickle, M.P., who wished the league all success and shipped over a fast one to Ald. Patterson. Instead of permitting Mayor Newman to display his ability as a catcher, the labor representative banged one to the outfield and was called safe at first when J. G. Elliott, holding down sack one, placed about six feet be-tween himself and the ball on the

The game was fast from beginning to end and at times it almost developed into a pitchers' duel. Norman Hughes, one of Chief Nesbitt's cop-, made his debut on the mound and held the Ponies down to six hits. He showed good control throughout the game but like Cherry he had to retire near the end under the strain. "Del" was up to regular form and was accorded very good support though some of Ponies' errers must have been disappointing to him. On the whole the teams were well bal-anced and it was a tight little, right little game all through.

to first on a bunt.


