**War-Year Racing in England.**  
The current English Racing Calendar shows that in 1918 the flat events under the Rules of Racing of the Jockey Club that were run in England numbered 364, of a value of \$787,685, and 382 races on flat, worth \$285,650, were run in Ireland. These figures take no account of steeplechasing or hurdle races, which are conducted under the rules of the National Hunt and Steeplechase Association. They compare but poorly with the returns in a normal season, nearly three million dollars having been distributed in purses in England in 1913, the year before the war. They are significant in the extreme, though, of the determination on the part of the authorities—Lloyd George declared it was a matter of national importance—to maintain the sport under incredible difficulties.

### PUZZLE TO SELECT WINNER.

The Big Fight Sentiment Swings Back and Forth.

With the heavyweight champion contest between Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey set for decision in less than three weeks, sporting authorities on the battle ground are frankly at a loss to select their favorite. All are agreed that probably no heavyweight contest since the memorable battle between James J. Corbett and John L. Sullivan has created such a variance of opinion. Sentiment seems to change every day. Willard, after an impressive workout, may become the favorite one; but the next may find sentiment switching to his youthful challenger.

"Wait till we see how Willard works in his training bouts the week before the match," invariably is the answer of all accredited boxing experts. Willard is finishing the second week of his serious preparation vastly improved, and there seems little doubt, in the opinion of experts, that he will be in first class condition within two weeks.

### Talcoff Quits League Job.

Frank Talcoff, Yale's great pitcher of 1913, says he is through with professional baseball. Talcoff some time ago broke into the big leagues with Detroit. He remained with the Tigers just long enough to decide that he had no chance of making an early start in an American League game, so he asked Hughie Jennings for his release and tied himself to the Philadelphia Nationals. Jack Coombs looked mighty indignant in the pitching department, and Talcoff figured that with the Phillies he would get his chance. But there too he was relegated to pitching divers no hit, no run games in the bull pen in addition to grooving the ball for the batters in practice. Finding this sort of life irksome Talcoff got his release from the Phillies and is back in this city doing regular work and pitching for the Paterson Silk Sox on Sundays.

Talcoff could get a job with any minor league club, but he cannot see himself pitching in the lesser company, because playing ball in the minors is not profitable work.

### COAST BASEBALL LEAGUE.

The Vancouver and Victoria Clubs Are Hit Hard.

The Northwestern International Baseball League is about to die a natural death. Tacoma has quit, while a dispatch from Victoria announces that the Victoria players have been paid off and the team disbanded. Vancouver and Seattle will finish out the series this week, after which, it is expected, professional baseball will be discontinued. A meeting of the league directors will be held here Monday morning at 10 o'clock, when final decision regarding the breaking up of the league will be made. It is expected, Tacoma has been the "bad" town of the league. No support was given the team by the Tacoma fans and as a result it was found necessary to quit. Vancouver has turned out fairly good crowds, but nothing to speak of, and when the directors meet, to decide to break up the league, they will be doing the best thing in the world for themselves, for the outlook at the present time for professional baseball is decidedly gloomy, and with the poor support given the teams, it is not worth while going further into the pocket-book. Bob Brown has a shrewd aggregation of baseball players, but they are not worth a grain of salt to him, unless he has the support of the fans, which he has not had this season.
