If the published reports from Western Canada concerning contemplated changes in the ownership of Doukhobor lands in favor of Canadian soldier settlers are true, one more migration, total or partial, of these Russian peasant communities may yet be witnessed.

One has associated the Doukhobors so long and definitely with Western Canada that the part of their career which has been the most formative in their history is apt to be overlooked.

The Doukhobors are a people exiled from their original home, but one cannot live in their vicinity without feeling the impression that they have long lost the sense of nationality as the average person understands it.
