STRIKERS SEND REPLY

To Civic Mediation Committee Regarding Locomotive Works Dispute.

A meeting of the executive committee of the Metal Trades Federation took place Friday to consider the communication from the civic mediation committee. The committee asked the metal workers to state the points in dispute with the Locomotive Company and also whether they were willing to meet the committee to negotiate a settlement. A reply was drawn up stating that an increase in wages was asked for and the establishment of the eight-hour day, also that the workers were quite willing to meet the committee along with the company's representatives to negotiate a settlement of the strike. This reply was sent to the civic committee.

A SETTLEMENT MADE
