Major Victor Williams, of the Army Medical Corps, and a son-in-law of A. P. Rowley, University Avenue, has been transferred to the military hospital at Cobourg.

THE FOURTH VICTIM OF THE EXPLOSION

Alexander Watts Died in the Hotel Dieu on Friday Evening.

Alexander Watts, the fourth victim in the boiler explosion on the wharfedock Atikokan at the Montpelier Transportation Company's wharf on Thursday afternoon, passed away at 8.30 p.m., Friday, in the Hotel Dieu. The unfortunate man was terribly burned by the steam.

The late Mr. Watts was born in Kingston, being a son of the late James Watts. He was aged fifty-four years and six months. For many years he was employed as a boilermaker, and was twenty years in the employment of the M.T. Company. Besides his widow, he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Emery, Mrs. C. Hartman and Mrs. H. Clark, all of Kingston; one step-daughter, Miss Pelow, and one brother, James Watts. The deceased was a member of St. George's Cathedral and the Canadian Order of Chosen Friends.
