WITH REGARD TO THE COMING LIQUOR REFERENDUM.

The Temperance Forces of Kingston Hold a Meeting to Organize for the Fall Campaign.

A largely attended and enthusiastic meeting under the auspices of the Ontario referendum committee (uniting all the temperance forces in the province) was held in the Y. M. C. A. parlors Thursday evening.

The gathering was opened in prayer by Archdeacon Dobbs, after which the meeting appointed Rev. T. W. Savary to the chair and Secretary F. Wilson, of the "Y," to act as secretary pro tem. Major H. F. McConnell, local organizer, was then introduced and outlined the programme of the provincial committee, asking that the meeting organize a district committee for the county of Frontenac to work in cooperation with the central organization of Toronto.

The plan of organization is very complete, and includes committees in every township, municipality and polling sub-division, and a county committee, while not completely organized, has nevertheless some splendid workers, who have already consented to act while the others are being interviewed and urged to accept the responsibility of heading up a strong campaign which will extend to every part of the county.

The plan of campaign includes the calling upon every man and woman over twenty-one years of age, acquainting them with the facts concerning their vote in the coming referendum to be taken in the fall; and also to see that a complete voters' list is prepared for use during the campaign. With organizations like the "Committee of One Hundred," the W.C.T.U., the Local Council of Women, the Ministerial Association and others co-operating and ready to meet at any night's meeting, it is felt that little difficulty will be experienced in getting the large staff of workers that will be necessary to carry on the work in the interests of the great temperance cause.

As soon as the general county organization is complete the committee will proceed with organizing complete machinery that will reach every part of the county. Literature is being issued soon by the provincial committee which will give full particulars as to the information sought in the proposed canvass.

Visiting His Old Home.

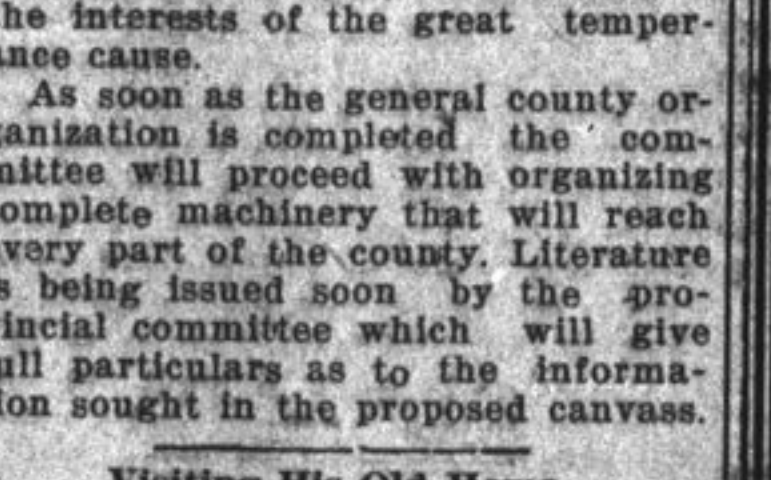
