Values of Art Life. It is indeed and in truth a pity that all cannot be brought into the circle of highly organized minds who can and do sincerely enter into the full appreciation of the finer values of art life. Many can be led by easy stages, if care is exercised to present each stage at the right time. A few young students who have been surrounded in the home with the better class of music, paintings and literature will often play a moderate amount of Bach's easier pieces, such as the arrangements by Leeftson, Spalding or Faxon. They will do this provided some interesting stories about Bach have paved the way.

Keeping Band Instruments Clean. More wind instruments are ruined by negligence as to cleanliness than by actual wear. Accumulation of dirt on the exterior and the deposit of saliva in the interior greatly impairs the usefulness of brass instruments by making them difficult to operate, hard to blow, and by throwing them out of tune. Saliva contains actively destructive properties and if allowed to remain in an instrument will eat its vital parts away with astonishing rapidity.

Musical Gossip. The metal of which orchestral bells are made is an alloy of tin and copper. Towns that have tested the value of a music festival are ready to support it in every way necessary. When you can sing a part in a chorus, you get more out of that work than you will if you merely sit in the audience as a listener. The piccolo part is written like the flute, but sounds an octave higher. The compass of the clarinet is 42 notes, and consequently more extensive than either the flute or oboe. There should be a close relationship between the music teaching done in our public and high schools and the musical life of the community.

FRENCH BLAME BRITISH FOR SINKING OF FLEET

The Admiralty Criticized For Failure to Maintain Guards Aboard Vessels. Paris, June 26.—Viscount Gustave de Kerguelen, member of the navy committee of the Chamber of Deputies, told the budget committee of the chamber yesterday that he had warned the French ministry of marine previously that the German fleet interned in Scapa Flow was not being watched with sufficient care.

The budget committee then decided to ask Premier Clemenceau for further information on the subject and the steps the French government proposed to take to have the logs made good. No higher comment in some cases shows much bitterness over the acts of those whom the Figaro calls "a perjured race with no respect for their pledged word." Some criticism is directed at the British Admiralty, the Journal saying: "No article in the press has foregone the maintenance of British guards aboard the German ships."

L'Ouvre says the fate of the German ships was that proposed for them by the British Government. "Germany," says The L'Action Francaise, "may one day, if we are not careful, scuttle the league of nations as she scuttled the fleet. Premier Lloyd George and Sir Robert Cecil will be just as much responsible that day as are now the scuttlers at Scapa Flow."

THE SKY THE LIMIT FOR LADIES' SHOES

Montreal Manufacturer Says They Must Pay For Fads They Demand. Ottawa, June 26.—F. H. Reider, president of the Amies-Holton-McCreedy Company, manufacturers of boots and shoes, told the Commerce Committee of the Commons yesterday that his company had not been able to pay dividends on the common stock nor had a dividend been paid on the preference stock for two years, but that a dividend of one and a half per cent could be paid this year.

He said that the market for leather was very high at present and it was difficult to get supplies. In January and February the surplus leather was bought up and taken out of the country by English buyers. He stated also that the quality of leather had become gradually inferior or during the last few years. He said that branded hides were one cent a pound lower in value than unbranded. No combination existed amongst boot and shoe manufacturers and there never had been one.

Asked as to the prices of the highest quality of ladies' shoes, Mr. Reider said the sky is the limit for ladies' shoes to-day. The reason was because they wanted style. White kid of the highest grade was sold to the retailer by the company at \$19.50 per pair. "What is the retail price?" asked Mr. Reider. "As high as they are willing to pay," was the answer. "They pay for the fashion." "They pay for fads."

The witness said that his company had raised prices on June 1st, and on June 15th, and would have to raise them again. In three months, the prices of calfskin had nearly doubled. Replying to a question by Mr. Devlin, witness stated from 1913 to 1918, the company had made \$1,533,653 on a capitalization of seven millions.
