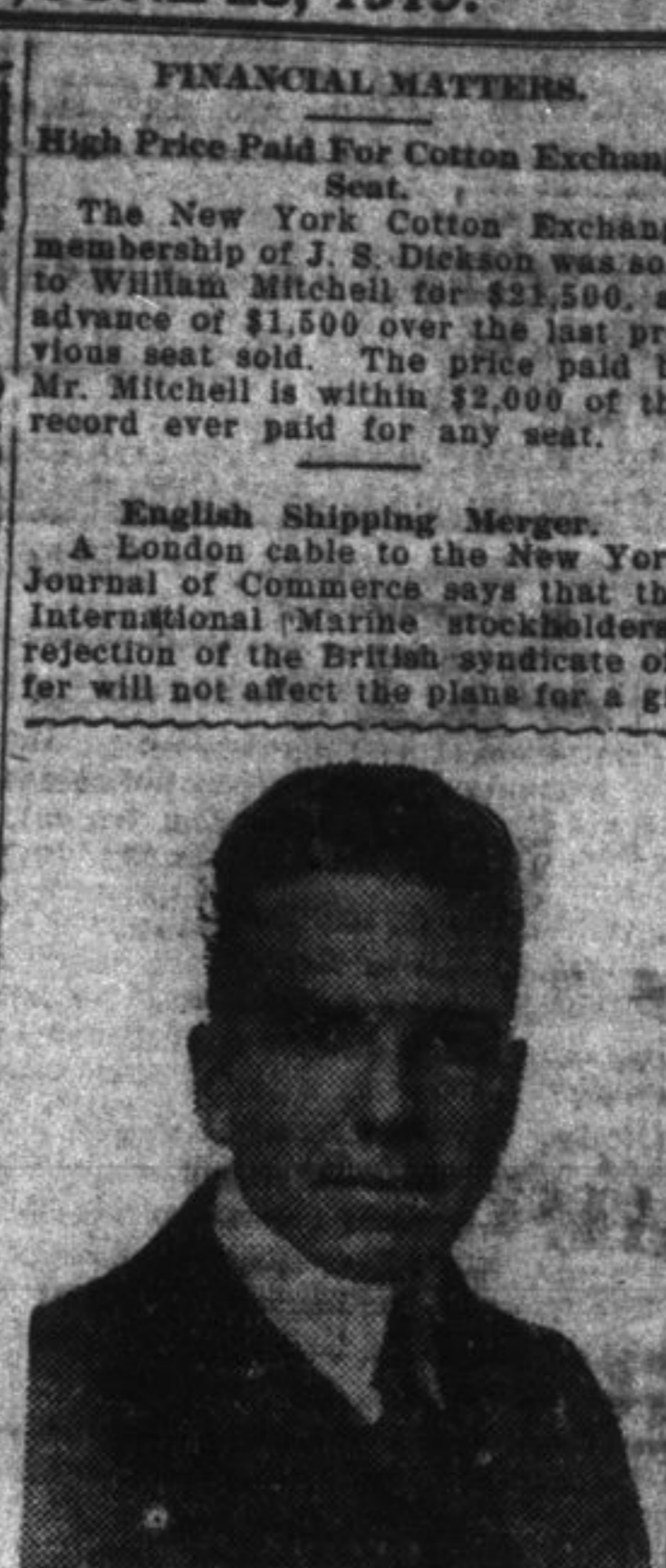

English Shipping Mergers. A London cable to the New York Journal of Commerce says that the International Marine stockholders' rejection of the British syndicate offer will not affect the plans for a general merger.

Bank Raises Dividend. The board of directors of La Banque Nationale have declared a dividend on the capital stock for the quarter ending July 31st of 3 1/2 per cent. which is at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum.

To Cut Tax Values. Shareholders of the Imperial Oil Company of Canada have received a circular calling a meeting for July and to decide the question as to the reduction of the par value of the company's stock from \$100 to \$25.

U.S. July Maturities. Corporate maturities on July 1st next approximate some \$95,000,000, divided among industrial, public utility and railroad companies. This compares with a total of nearly \$50,000,000 on June 1st and \$70,250,000 July 1st, 1918.

High Prices Paid For Cotton Exchange. The New York Cotton Exchange membership of J. S. Dickson was sold to William Mitchell for \$23,500, an advance of \$1,500 over the last previous sale. The price paid by Mr. Mitchell is within \$2,000 of the record ever paid for any seat.
