THE WORLD'S TIDINGS IN BRIEF FORM

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pointed and Pithy Way.

In Chicago hog values climbed to a new pinnacle, \$21.75 a hundred-weight.
Ex-King Constantine of Greece has left Lucerne for Lugano in order to reduce expenses.
Two men were killed in a coal mine explosion at Alderson, Oklahoma. Three others are expected to die.
Important measures relating to criminal offences against women were passed by the Senate on Tuesday.
Frank Hogg, while shingling the roof of his brother's house, near Seaford, fainted and fell off, being killed instantly.
Denmark has borrowed a large sum of money from America to cover the estimated expense of re-uniting Schleswig to Denmark.
A cotton crop of about 1,000,000 bales smaller than last year is forecast for this year by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
The municipality of Greater Berlin has decided to purchase the big Berlin tramway system. A strike of the workers is threatened.
William Greensides, Toronto, aged nineteen, employed by a farmer near Colton, was drowned while bathing in the Nottawasaga River.
A returned soldier, believed to be G. Blaine, laid his neck across the rail in front of a train at Mileage 95, west of Chapleau, and was instantly killed.
Virtually all of Montenegro is in rebellion against Serbian military occupation. Bloody encounters have occurred and guerrilla warfare is prevalent at many points.
Mowat Wait, a switchman, was fatally crushed and two other men were injured when the track buckled under the C.N.R. engine on which they were riding at Trenton.
Rains have been general in the Saskatchewan district during the past three days. The ground is now practically saturated in all parts and crops will undoubtedly benefit.
The quaint, medieval military ceremony of reading the King's message of peace now exists with Germany, was read Wednesday at five points in London.
The United States House Judiciary committee probably will meet next Monday to report out a straight bill for enforcement of war-time prohibition so as to stop the sale of 2% per cent. beer.
The Krupp works at Munich have been sold to America according to despatches from Munich. It is added several industrial concerns in the Bavarian capital also have passed into American hands.
The Dutch Queen has sent her consort to persuade the former German crown prince that it would be detrimental to Holland, which granted him hospitality, if he participated in a revolt in Germany.
The Germans expect to ratify the peace treaty early next week, according to a note sent to the Allies. The Germans expressed the hope that their war prisoners would be released at the same time.
In the Commons Wednesday, Hon. Dr. Reid introduced a bill respecting electric and power companies. It will embody the disputes of public rights classes, in connection with the consolidated railway bill.
Police guards were placed at all public buildings in New York, churches and homes of public officials and citizens who "have spoken against socialism and anarchy," by order of Police Commissioner Enright.
The Royal North-West Mounted Police yesterday again raided the Labor Temple and searched the homes of thirty members of the radical socialist party in Winnipeg and seized documents of a revolutionary character.
With practically a unanimous vote the employees of the Toronto street railway company, at a mass meeting Wednesday morning, declined to accept the latest offer of the Ontario Railway Board, and the strike continues.
The strike of the commercial telegraphers against the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies was on Wednesday afternoon declared off at New York by Percy Thomas, deputy international president.
The Liberals in caucus at Ottawa, Wednesday morning, decided to erect by popular subscription a monument to the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier. This memorial would be in addition to the statue in Parliament Hall for which \$25,000 has been voted by the Commons.
Frosts Damage Crops.
Quebec, July 2.—Frosts caused extensive damage to crops Sunday in this district. Tomatoes, peas, beans and early berries were ruined in a number of places, while in other areas potatoes were damaged, although not ruined.
