The funeral was held yesterday afternoon to Gananoque cemetery, and was largely attended. Word was received here by relatives yesterday of the death of James Hayward, a former esteemed resident and business man of this section, who passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Williams, of Toronto, after being in failing health for some time. Deceased was twice married; his first wife being a Miss Stundon, sister of D. H. Stundon, Wellington street, by whom he leaves two daughters, Mrs. Williams, at whose home he passed away, and Miss Lizzie Hayward, who is married to a Mr. Hayward. The funeral took place this afternoon with Masonic honors. The remains were interred at Willowbank cemetery here.

WAS CHARGED WITH THEFT

FOLLOWING FINDING OF MILITARY GOODS IN HIS HOME.

Michael McNally Has Been Before Magistrate Thirty-six Times in Last Six Years—Young Couple Air Domestic Troubles.

On Wednesday afternoon a warrant was taken out to search the home of Sergt. Major Herbert Fowler. A large quantity of military blankets, coats, boots and other military goods were found, and seized by the city and military police. Constable Lesslie Clark placed Fowler under arrest on a charge of theft. A truck was used to carry the stuff to the police station.

When the case was called Thursday morning in Police Court the accused did not plead. A. B. Cunningham appeared for him, and asked that he be handed over to the military authorities for court-martial. The magistrate agreed, stating that the goods recovered would be held by the police pending the result of the case.

A young man giving the name of John Morris was being intoxicated, but stated that all he had was some beef, iron and wine. He admitted being "a little stupid," as he put it, but denied being intoxicated. Constable Cotter found him decorating the corner of Princess and Montreal streets at 10:05 p.m. Wednesday. He was remanded to jail.

Michael McNally admitted being intoxicated in a public place. Magistrate Farrell, who looked up Michael's record, stated that he had appeared before the court thirty-six times in the last six years. He was fined \$20 and costs or three months for having liquor in a place other than a private dwelling, another thirty-one was fined \$200 and costs.

Margaret Bird, very young, with a two-year-old baby, said her husband, Harry Bird, did not provide the necessities of life for herself and child. She said she often had to go hungry, and would have fared very badly if her mother and her husband's brother had not helped her. She told of "stealing" \$2 out of her husband's pocket a few days ago, but he claimed he gave her this money.

The magistrate enlarged the case for a week, in order to see if conditions would improve in the Bird home.

WANT A BONUS

For the Men Who Served Canada in the War.

Vancouver, July 3.—After an all day discussion the Great War Veterans Association in the Dominion convention has adopted a resolution calling on the Dominion Government to grant one thousand dollar bonus to all men who served in Canada with \$500 extra for those who went overseas and still another \$500 for men who served in the actual theatre of war. The resolution as adopted was very similar to the famous Calgary resolution.

Death of Olden Resident.

Olden, July 1.—On June 17th death claimed an old and respected resident in the person of Murdoch McCharles, aged seventy-seven years. Deceased was of a quiet disposition. He was able to walk about until the day before he died. Mr. McCharles resided over fifty years on the farm where he died. Besides his aged wife, he leaves three sons and two daughters, George, of North Bay; Robert and John, at home; Mrs. George McPherson, of this place; Mrs. James Hamely, Sharbot's Lake; also two brothers, a number of grandchildren and one great-grandchild. He was a Methodist in religion and a Conservative in politics. Rev. Ivoe Currie-Mills had charge of the funeral.
