
WANT A BONUS

Vancouver, July 3.—After an all day discussion the Great War Veterans Association in the Dominion

convention has adopted a resolution calling on the Dominion Government to grant one thousand dollar bonus to all men who served in Canada, with \$500 extra for those who went overseas and still another \$500 for men who served in the actual theatre of war. The resolution as adopted was very similar to the famous Calgary resolution.
