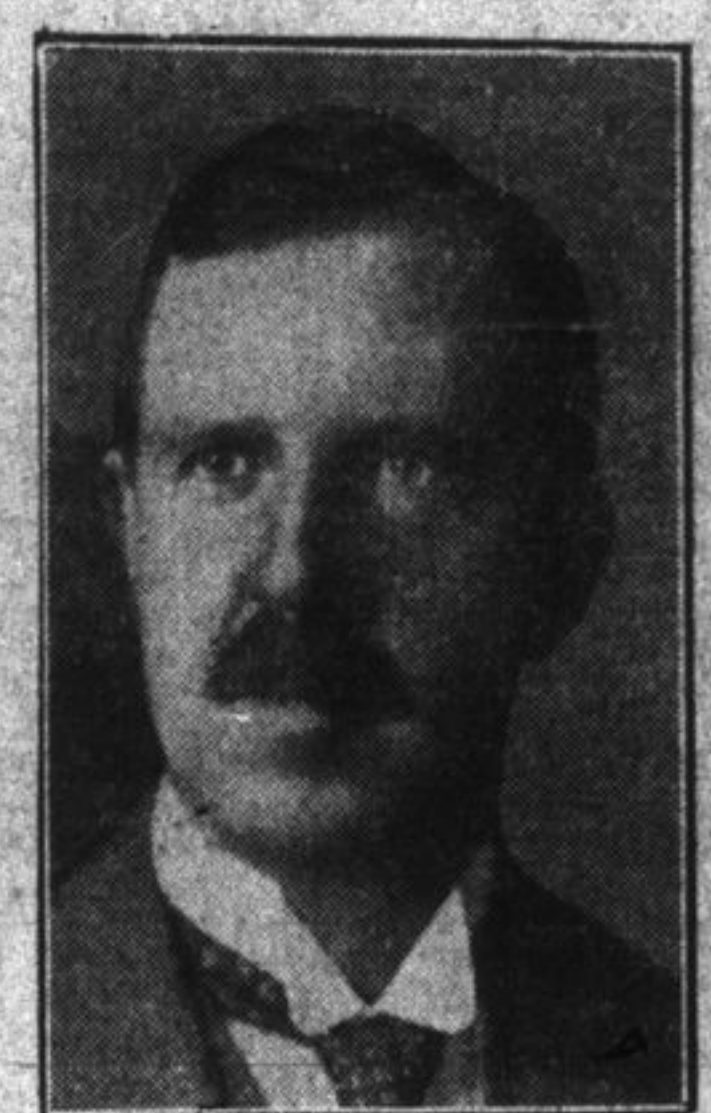
Voted Against a Strike.

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\$100,000 FOR TRADE SCHOOL.

Will Provides for Erection of Institution at Ogdensburg.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., July 4.—The will of the late George Hall contains a bequest of \$100,000 for the erection and equipment of a trade school in Ogdensburg, to be under the jurisdiction of the Board of Education. He also endows it. It will be called the George Hall Trade School. The estate is valued at half a million. He also gives \$10,000 for the erection of a fireproof addition to the library building, for the purpose of housing the Remington collection.

HOOPER HAS RESIGNED.

HERBERT HOOPER New York, July 4.—Resignation of Herbert Hoover as chairman of the board of directors of the Food Administration Grain Corporation and reorganization of the corporation under the name of "U.S. Grain Corporation," was announced at the annual meeting of the stockholders here yesterday. Hoover's place as chairman will be filled by Julius Barnes, wheat director, who also is president of the corporation.
