EMPLOYMENT CONDITIONS

CONTINUE VERY SATISFACTORY IN KINGSTON.

This City Maintains Its Position As Second In the Dominion for the Results Obtained for the Returned Soldiers.

The weekly report of the Information and Service Branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment is very interesting reading. It gives a resume of conditions in the labor world all over the dominion, and tells of the great work that is being done by that department in placing returned soldiers in employment. The report states that while the Winnipeg strike is now over, it is still too early for its influence to be felt elsewhere. Labor conditions are improving, and several new fields of employment are being opened up to Canadian soldiers. For instance, it is reported that the Canada Steamship Lines, instead of engaging their help in the United States through a Montreal employment agency, have obtained their supply this summer through the Canadian government employment offices, and are employing returned soldiers wherever possible.

A feature of this week's report is the special mention given to the securing of employment for a disabled soldier with only two fingers on his right hand, by W. G. Bailey, the Kingston unit demobilization officer. From London, Ont., comes the report that employment was found for two cripples, one minus a leg and an arm, and the other minus an arm. Both of them were placed in good positions in a factory in Kitchener.

The figures for the Kingston office show that the employment situation is still very satisfactory. During the week 123 men applied to A. Tugwood, the local labor representative, for positions. All of these, with eleven others whose applications were left over from last week, were referred to vacancies, and 122 of them were placed in suitable situations. This shows a percentage of 99.2 for the Kingston office. Kingston thus maintains its position as the second district in the dominion for the results obtained, the Thunder Bay district being next with a percentage of 116.6. Kingston is now the headquarters for southeastern Ontario information and service branches.

The report also shows that since the signing of the armistice, 207,981 soldiers of all ranks have been returned to Canada, of which number 5,472 returned last week. The figures for Kingston show that 577 soldiers returned to the local dispersal station last week, and that 9,253 have returned to this district since the beginning of demobilization. The only complete unit still to return to the city is No. 7 (Queen's) General Hospital.

A great crowd of citizens and farmers participated in the festivities of the day and many races and sports were held. A delicious supper was served and in the evening a dance was enjoyed on a spacious floor. Several hundred cars brought young folk from the city and countryside and the dance was continued until a late hour under the glare of electric lights which had been provided by Mr. Grace. A great many prominent farmers and citizens were in attendance.

Returned From Overseas.

Lieut. E. H. Pense, of the Railway Troops, accompanied by his wife and three children, returned from England on Thursday. They made the trip over on the S.S. Gramplan. Lieut. Pense left Kingston three years ago with a Pioneer Battalion, with the rank of major, but reverted to a lieutenant in order to get to France. On going over with the infantry he was recalled for the Railway Battalion owing to the fact that he was an engineer and a graduate of the R. M. C. His sister, Matron Emma Pense, will be home shortly.

Portsmouth School Board.

The Portsmouth public school board met Thursday evening. Trustee Halden was appointed chairman pro tem. The resignation of Miss C. Esson was accepted. An application from Miss Wood of Sydneyham was received and accepted at \$700 per annum.

The estimates were taken up and discussed. The Board will require \$1925 for the present year.

Gave Fine Concert.

Macdonald Park was thronged with people on Thursday night, for the concert given by the Salvation Army band and the programme was a most delightful one, each number being of a very high order. The band showed up well in the various selections and the concert solo were a special feature.

NOTICE TO IMPERIALS.

War Badges For Members Who Served in the War.

War service badges, Class "A" or "C," issued to members of the C.E.F., are now being issued to those members of the Imperial Forces who were domiciled in Canada on Aug. 4th, 1914, and served in the Imperial Forces in the European war and have since returned to take up their residence in Canada.

Owing to change of policy these badges will now be issued by District Record Officers and not by Officer Paying Imperial Pensions, Ottawa, as previously stated.

Ex-members of the Imperial Forces eligible for the award of the above mentioned badges will apply for the badge to which they are entitled to the District Record Officer of the Military District in which they reside.

SUPERVISOR OF WORK.

A. E. Beswick in Charge of Work on New R.M.C. Building.
In answer to Dr. J. W. Edwards, M.P., in the House at Ottawa, Hon. Mr. Burrell stated that A. E. Beswick had been appointed as supervisor or clerk of the works, in connection with the new R.M.C. building now being constructed, at a salary of \$250 a month. He was appointed by the Civil Service Commission on June 5th.

Mr. Beswick enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces in October, 1914, and served for three and one-half years as machine gun officer, including seventeen months in France and was returned to Canada as a casualty and honorably discharged in June, 1918.
