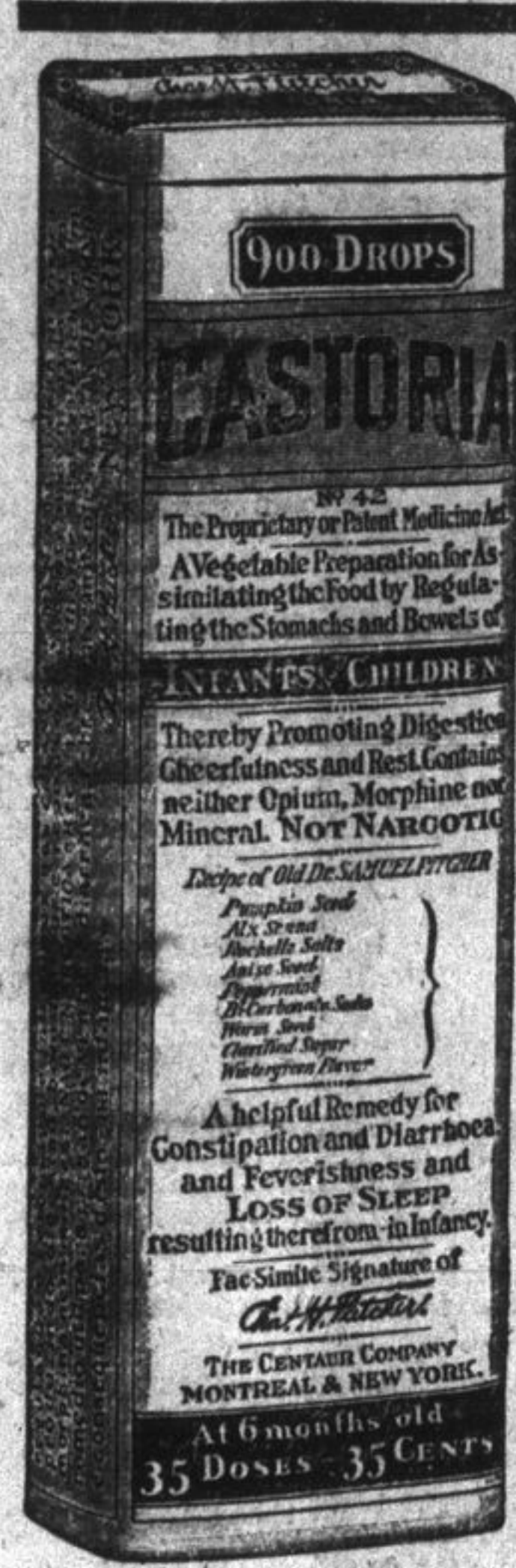


Germany Promised

Explains English Girls' Attitude

Sydenham, Ont., July 7.—(To the Editor): It is with considerable interest that I have been reading various contributions to your valuable paper entitled Canadian vs. English Girls.

This subject has already been so exhaustively treated by correspondents possessing perhaps greater literary qualifications, that it is with some degree of hesitancy that I would submit my humble opinion for public criticism. Furthermore, it is neither my desire or intention in this article, to make unfavorable comparisons, but to discourage to some extent what seems to be the general consensus of opinion, by some who have not had the opportunity of studying the English people, as a whole, in their own country and who seem inclined to misinterpret the motives by which these same people were prompted to offer so much kindness to the colonial soldiers.

Personally I know of several instances where they have gone to considerable inconvenience and expense to do some act of kindness for a soldier whom they could not possibly have had any other interest than to, in some measure, liquidate the debt created by the sacrifices which they considered we were making in their behalf.

I feel thoroughly convinced that if Canadian girls had been brought face to face with the realities of war in the manner that English girls have, a great percentage of them would probably have risen to the occasion just as promptly.

As for girls of the old country chasing after Canadians for their money or to marry, I think you will discover on investigation that girls of this class are of the same type as the girl in France who married the eight Americans some time ago, and are to be found in all countries.

However, this contribution is not concerned with people of such calibre, but of the better middle classes, whom I think you will agree usually represent the best of any country from a social and moral standpoint.
