

Chimney Sickness.

Chimney sickness is a complaint the Saganoseki chimney in Chicago might get it.

The chimney of Saganoseki is the tallest in the world. The shaft stretches up 550 feet above the foundation pier, and as the base is 450 feet above sea-level to start with, the place where the smoke comes out is actually 1,000 feet up, and the wind up there averages about double the velocity of the wind down below. Chimney sickness is due not to the height alone but to the swaying of the chimney. In a bad gale the Saganoseki chimney sways 15 inches from side to side.
