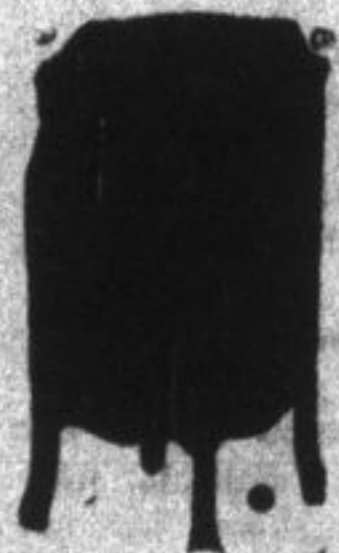

SIXTY YEARS ON THE LAKE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

JOSEPH NORRIS IS THE OLDEST STEWARD IN SERVICE TO-DAY

Arrived on the Steamer Kalkaska, From Chicago, with a Cargo of Corn for Richardson's Elevator—Was Born and Raised at Garden Island.

To have sailed on the great lakes and also the salt water, in the capacity of a steward, for a period of sixty years, is the proud record of Joseph Norris, who is on the steamer Kalkaska, which arrived from Chicago with corn, and is now unloading at Richardson's elevator. Mr. Norris is no doubt the oldest in point of years and service on the lakes to-day. He is seventy-eight years of age, but is still as active as a man thirty years his junior.

"Yes, I guess I am the oldest, and if not, one of the oldest men in the business," said Mr. Norris, when interviewed by a Whig representative on Friday morning. Do you know it is just twenty-one years since I was in Kingston, and on that occasion it was my first time here in twenty-five years. It seems pretty quiet around here now, compared with the lakes. This harbor was a busy place. I have seen a half dozen or so vessels being built here, and there was a great traffic in grain; I was born and raised on Garden Island, just across from Kingston, and the first vessel I made a trip on was the old brig "William Penn."

Mr. Norris inquired about Garden Island, and appeared rather disappointed to learn that there was no shipping out of there now, and that it had simply been turned into a summer resort.

The veteran steward, in addition to his long career on the lakes, also sailed on the salt water, and travelled extensively in England, Ireland and also spent some time in Mexico, when there were some very stirring times there.

Mr. Norris is a brother of Robert Norris, shipbuilder, of Portsmouth. He is also an old friend of Ex-Ald. Joseph Hooper. He was very glad of the opportunity of visiting Kingston again. He makes his home in Chicago, when he is not sailing.

The Whig ran across Mr. Norris while he was busy engaged at D. J. Millan's store, making his purchase. Mr. Norris certainly knows how to look after the boys on his vessel. He has been in the business so long that he knows "all the tricks of the trade," as the saying goes, and the fellow who ships on the vessel on which he is the steward is sure to get three square meals and a lunch if he requires it. Mr. Norris has been a faithful painstaking man in his business, and his services are greatly appreciated by the company employing him.

Barbers Explain Position. Kingston, July 11.—(To the Editor: In view of the misrepresentation and misunderstanding in the city, concerning the present differences between the Master Barbers and their employees now on strike, the undersigned journeymen desire to give a clear statement regarding the situation, and to make an appeal to the public of Kingston, after being placed in full possession of the facts, to decide as to the reasonableness and justice of our claims.

Till the declaration of the strike, the journeymen barbers had worked nine and a half hours per day from Monday to Friday, and on Saturday twelve hours, exclusive of meal hours, and without the half-holiday, which has been conceded by employers in the trade in almost every other city in Canada. They have been paid at the rate of \$15 per week, and half a taking of their work over \$21, bringing their average wage to around \$25 per week.

On June 23rd we submitted to the master barbers a new schedule to become operative on July 1st, asking that working hours be reduced two and a half hours per week, that we start work at 8 a.m. and work until 7 p.m., (instead of 7.30), and did not ask what has been freely conceded by almost every employer in the business in the dominion, a half-holiday, and we proposed to work the full twelve hours on Saturday.

In addition to the reduction of working time, we asked for an increase in salary which would approximate \$1.50 per week, and notwithstanding the reasonableness and justice of these demands, the master barbers refused to grant them and still refuse. Had all of these reasonable and just demands been met by the employers, there would be absolutely no need for any increase in price, either for shaving or hair-cutting.

Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for the insertion of this explanation of our position and hoping it may tend to clear away the smoke and fog which has been raised around the real issue, and thanking the citizens for so loyally lending us their moral support. We are, yours respectfully,

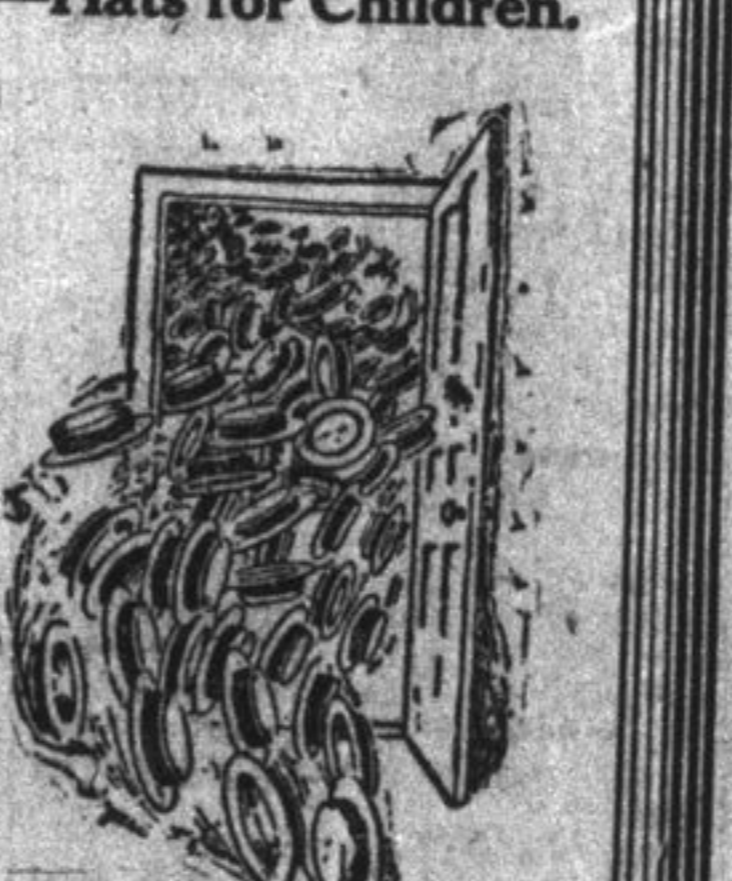

TO EXAMINE ARCHBISHOP To Discover What Personal Property He Possesses. The case of Sister Mary Basil against Archbishop Spratt et al, is still before the courts. The Court of Appeal at Toronto last fall rendered a verdict holding in favor of the Archbishop. Sister Mary Regis of the House of Providence and Dr. Daniel Phehan personally responsible for the attempted abduction of the plaintiff from St. Mary's-of-the-Lake, and exempting the Episcopal Corporation and the Sisters of Charity of the House of Providence from the jury's verdict of \$24,000. Some months ago proceedings were taken to seize the personal belongings of Archbishop Spratt to satisfy the judgment against him. The sale was done in regard to Dr. Phehan. Now A. B. Cunningham has taken out an order for examination of the Archbishop to ascertain what personal property he has. The examination is to take place next Wednesday before T. M. Asselstine, clerk of the Supreme Court here. It is stated that \$6,000 is the salary attached to the position of Archbishop of Kingston.

Given a Life Interest. Five hundred dollars household goods, \$730 debts, \$2,160 stocks, \$1,050 securities make up the estate of \$8,943 of James N. Whithead, Toronto. By his will his sister in Kingston receives life interest in fund of \$5,000, while the household goods and residue go to his wife in Toronto.
