THE WORLD'S TIDINGS IN CONDENSED FORM

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pointed and Pithy Way.

Steven Marcoso was instantly killed by the caving in of a tunnel in the Walkerville coal yards.

Sir Augustus Noyce and A. W. Austin have been made vice-presidents of the Dominion Bank.

The dirigible R-34 speeding eastward had reached approximately 1500 miles from her starting point at noon.

U.S. Secretary Polk, announces that trade between United States and Germany may be resumed immediately.

H. Percival Dodge, Massachusetts, was nominated by President Wilson to be minister of the Kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes.

Nazzeino Tonassin, an Italian carpenter, was killed by a fall to a cement floor while at work on the Hydro Canal construction.

Securities valued at \$2,000,000 belonging to former King Ferdinand of Bulgaria have been declared forfeited by the British courts.

Sergt. Harvey Davison, 71st Battalion, twenty-eight years old, and recently married, was electrocuted at his brother's home in Woodstock.

The British Government has decided to appoint a Parliamentary body to report on some measures for legislation evolution along the lines of Federalism.

The official text of the German National Assembly's ratification of the peace treaty, which has been signed by President Ebert, will arrive in Paris shortly by a special courier from Weimar.

Marshal Joffre, it was announced in the French Chamber of Deputies, will lead the troops during the first part of their triumphal march in Paris on Bastille day, July 14th.

The White Star liner Celtic docked at Halifax Friday morning after a passage of seven days from Liverpool. She brought 139 officers and nursing sisters, one cadet, thirteen other ranks and fifty sailors.

Judge Emerson Coatsworth has been appointed to the Senior Judgeship of the county of York to succeed the late Judge Winchester.

Judge Denton has been promoted to succeed Judge Coatsworth.

The Italian Chamber of Labor has issued a manifesto saying that, having received guarantees that the prices of necessities will be reduced fifty per cent, it invites the people to return to work.

President Wilson has accepted the resignation of Edward N. Hurley as chairman of the U. S. shipping board effective August 1st. It is said Mr. Hurley will be succeeded by John Barton Payne of Chicago.

Marshal Foch was on Thursday instructed by the Council of Five to send notification to the Polish troops to cease action in Lithuania. The Bulgarian treaty, it is announced, will come up for consideration on July 25th.

The Mennonite school case, which is to decide whether Mennonites will be allowed to retain their present system of education, including the teaching of German, is to be taken to the Privy Council of the House of Lords.

Bolshevik agents are at work in Montreal carrying on a campaign to gain support among the returned soldiers. The "I.W.W." have formed an industrial council and are endeavoring to secure allegiance of all leagues formed by war veterans.

Tripped Merrily.
Carleton Place Contrar Canadian. Major Hooper, who is stationed at Kingston, tripped merrily into town Monday, for the first. Foot and tongue are as nimble as in pre-war time and he glided hither and thither on ball bearings. His khaki career will end in September when he shall change his apparel from the colors of conflict to those of rest and repose.

Military News

Officers and soldiers of the Canadian expeditionary force who displayed gallantry while escaping or attempting to escape from the enemy, or who rendered exceptional services whilst prisoners of war or interned, are eligible for a reward. An order of the militia department, just issued, states that recommendations for such reward may now be submitted. The facts supporting each recommendation must be substantiated by statements of evidence from at least two witnesses, who have first-hand knowledge of the circumstances, and should reach militia headquarters before August 31st. Officers and soldiers who are still serving should submit their claims through the usual official channels. Those who have been demobilized should proceed through the officer commanding the military district in which they live.

Capt. Jackson, who has since his return from England been acting as a medical officer of No. 3 Military District, and has recently been doing duty at Barrield Hospital, has been demobilized. He has been given the position of orthopedic officer in the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, and will commence his duties at once.

Lieut. Light, who has acted as adjutant of the R. C. H. A. during the past five years, and rendered most efficient service, is being succeeded by Captain Fort, C.F.A., late of the C.E.F. Lieut. Light, took over the duties of adjutant when the Valcartier Camp closed in the fall of 1914, and in all the work of training recruits in which his unit was engaged he did splendid work. Captain Fort is well known being a Kingston man and a son of Mr. Fort of the Bank of Montreal. Lieut. Light resumes his duties as bandmaster of the R.C. H.A.

Pte. Dully, late of the C.E.F., passed away in Queen's Military hospital on Thursday. He had been transferred to Queen's from Waikato hospital suffering from nephritis on May 12th. Deceased is survived by a sister, Miss Dully, 22 Russell street this city. The funeral is to take place with military honors on Saturday.

An enjoyable time was spent on the river Thursday by 250 soldier patients of Queen's military hospital. The steamer Brockville was chartered by Captain McNabb, chaplain services, and the men left at 10.30 a.m. The trip was made down through the Thousand Islands and lunch was served at Dominion Lands No. 1. After lunch they proceeded down the American channel and the return trip was made by the Canadian channel. Salisbury's orchestra was engaged and the music was greatly enjoyed. Besides the patients, there were a number of nurses and the medical officers. The boat returned at 7.00 p.m., and cars were on hand to convey the men to the hospital. Miss Hora, who arranged for the cars, and owners who loaned them, were very warmly thanked by the men for their kindness in contributing to the pleasure of the day.

The Empress of Britain was expected to dock at Halifax this morning and the Araguaya will dock at Portland on Saturday. Their lists are not yet available.
