### FAILURE FACES OLYMPIAD.

Nations Unprepared to Compete in Antwerp Games.

Will the nations of the world be ready for the proposed Olympic games at Antwerp next year? This question is one that is "hot" in the world of amateur sport, and one which has been being argued since the results registered at the track and field games, which have just been finished in Paris. The European nations made a pitiable showing in the contests arranged and staged by the American army. Even France which enjoyed the undeniable advantage of being the "at-home" nation, failed to make even a show of resistance.

It is understood that in the event of the international games being held at Antwerp in 1920 England will not make any effort at all to organize a team. The Britons believe, and rightly, that before their country goes out to make a showing in international sports a long period of development must be gone through.

When it is considered that some forty per cent. of England's manpower, between the ages of twenty and thirty-one, has been killed, or, at least, wounded during the past five years, it is not hard to see the matter from the Englishman's point of view.

A 1920 Olympiad meet must necessarily result in a dual match between Sweden and the United States, with the other nations partially out of it. If the alleged international athletic test is to turn out in such fashion it would be better for Sweden and America to have their own little athletic quarrel in this country, allowing the other nations to go along about their development meanwhile.

An attempt to hold a real international athletic gathering in Europe next year must necessarily result in a competitive failure, because of the discouraging conditions, are looked on as serious rivals for the athletic championship of the world.

### "AUSSIES" ARE COMING.

Australian Tennis Players to Compete in United States.

"The Aussies are coming," was the favorite cry of the Huns when they used to take to the woods during the progress of an attack on the western front.

Well, the Yank tennis stars can now utter the same cry of alarm, for there will sail from England next week four of the finest tennis players in the universe—G. L. Patterson, R. Lycett, Norman Brooks and R. V. Thomas.

These stars, who represent the Antipodes, are coming this way for the avowed purpose of lifting the American tennis championship, and their chances of success certainly do not look so bad.

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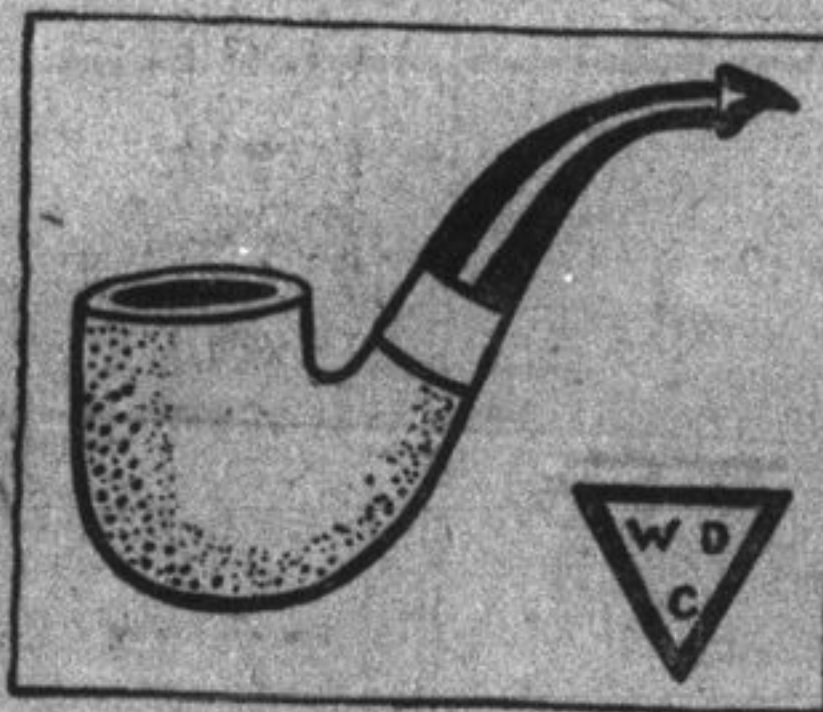
