EVENT AT COLLINS BAY INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

PRESENTATIONS MADE TO MEN RETURNED FROM WAR.

Garden Party On Lawn of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Rankin—Addresses By Dr. Edwards, W. F. Nickle, Col. Dawson and Others.

Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Rankin, Collins Bay, who have been foremost in war activities, especially since the men have been coming back, worn with strain and stress of battle, added one more kindness to the returned soldier by throwing open their lovely house and grounds for a garden party on Tuesday afternoon and evening, given in honor of the men of the vicinity who have come back from France. In the garden under the lovely old trees was the tea table, where Mrs. Reid, Ottawa, and Mrs. Elmer Davis, Kingston, poured tea, and a number of bright faced girls in pretty frocks, waiting on the many guests. Home-made dainties, sweets and ice cream were sold by the ladies in charge and a good sum realized.

For the evening a good programme was arranged with Dr. J. W. Edwards in the chair. There were songs by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Craig, Mr. Kery (Detroit), Violin and piano duet by Howard and Peter Fair, an amusing Irish recitation by Canon Fitzgerald, and several numbers by Geoffrey O'Hara, whose Irish wit has done so much to enliven the monotony of the training camps of the American army. W. F. Nickle, M.P., spoke briefly on the object of the gathering, congratulating the returned men of the district, who were to receive a token of appreciation from their friends and neighbors on the part they had played in France and Flanders, and voicing the pleasure of the people of Kingston at their safe return.

Then the event of the evening took place, when the chairman presented each man with a gold ring with his initials and "The Great War" engraved on it. The recipients were, first for her husband, killed in action, Mrs. A. Cosky; A. E. Redden, A. M. Day, C. Van Alstyne, R. Van Alstyne, E. J. Day, G. Leonard, H. W. Yeoman, J. E. Meare, G. McLean, W. McLean, James Robertson, H. Baker G. G. Lashford.

Dr. Edwards then called on Lieut. Col. Dawson, D.S.O., C.M.G., to speak for the returned men which he did in a simple, manly way, referring to the band that banded men of all ranks together at the front and saying that one of the men who received the token had been in his command at Passchendaele. He assured those who had organized this "welcome home" that it would give much real pleasure to for whom it was arranged.

Major William Nickle, M.C., was then called upon to speak, which he did very briefly, referring as Colonel Dawson also had done to the work of the women who kept the men at the front and in the hospitals supplied with comforts. The singing of the National Anthem brought a most successful and pleasant day to a close.
