Bretonne Embroidery

Nineteenth in a Series of Articles on Needlework

The cathedral in France are works of art from within as well as without. For it is consistent with the wonderful architecture, the decorations of the altar, the work of the master-worker. Figure I. illustrates the first step.

Figure II. the central and main part of the design, is done entirely in the oblique stitch, while the border design is a combination of the oblique and the horizontal straight which can also be made any size.

The design shown to-day is only one of the innumerable patterns which can be worked in bretonne embroidery:

One can form squares, triangles, diamonds, Greek and Roman borders, necks and other types simply by varying the position of the threads.

The women of America have been used to thinking that any handiwork to be worth while must be exported; that, for some reason or other, their fingers did not possess the subtle art that made embroidery beautiful.

But the war has been responsible for a number of things, and among other lessons it has taught the American women their own capabilities and possibilities.

They have not been able to get handiwork to sell in other shores and so they have discovered that themselves could add a vanity of finishing touches to their own personal dress or to the accessories of home decoration.

They began to show an interest in embroidery because of necessity, but they have continued to exhibit an interest in the work itself.


These readers who have profited by the former lessons will find that bretonne embroidery is no more difficult to learn, and certainly it is no less attractive than the others.

HINTS ON HEALTH AND BEAUTY



BEGIN THE NEW YEAR BY CULTIVATING POISE AND GRACE WITH DAILY EXERCISE

We are so accustomed to dealing with beauty as it relates to the complexion, the hair, the eyes, &c., that we are prone to forget that grace of movement and poise in bearing count just as vitally in the sum total of charm.

How many of us have ever taken the time or trouble to analyze any of the different types of figures that we daily see?

We abhor those that are ugly, perhaps, and admire those that are well proportioned and graceful, but that is about all the interest that most of us take in the matter.

Sum Total of Charm. Yet if we would try to find out the real reason for our being attracted by some certain individuals, while others we pass by without a second glance, we might find that we were discovering one of the prime factors in that attribute of which we talk so glibly and yet really understand so little—personality.

Sometimes, of course, it is loveliness of feature or coloring that has appealed to our artistic sense, but just as frequently

it is a freedom of movement, a well balanced pose that has caught our attention and won our admiration in passing.

Contrast exerts every bit as strong an appeal to our interest as does similarity, and if we would study the really unpossessing types of figures that we see, we would at least advance so far toward the goal of perfection as not to allow ours to become what all too many of them are.

In walking just one block we see many kinds in many moods. First comes the plump, dowdy woman with stooping shoulders and narrow chest, whose clothes seem to have been donned for mere decency's sake, rather than with any attempt at trimness or grace.

Then the languid lady saunters by, too weary to even stand erect, too lazy to look anything but past and past listless.

Next comes into view the masculine girl, and she strides past with shoulders well back, it is true, and an air of dignity, but still lacking in something.

With strength thrown upon the left foot and the right foot one step behind, let mildly stretch her arms forward and then draw them back, pushing back the shoulders as far as they will go. In the same position let her then stretch them out vigorously at the sides.

A Graceful Walk.

The last movement is a bit more strenuous and requires more practice. She still retains the same position with her feet and, bending sideways, attempts to touch the left heel with the left hand, and vice versa.

To exercise the ankle cross the feet so that one is raised entirely from the floor and twist it forward, back and around, being certain the work is done from the ankle joint and not from the knee.

Miss Julia Lathrop, chief of the Children's Bureau, Washington, is making an investigation of the child labor employment in North Carolina.

The National Women's Council meeting in New York, June 10, 1919, has decided to have a world peace celebration the two days before Good Friday.

Over 100,000 women were recruited for positions by the women's bureau of the United States Employment Service while the war was in progress.

Of the 1,800,000 people with votes in the sixty-one London constituencies 786,000 were women.

Miss Florence A. Stone, of San Francisco, Cal., is the first woman mail carrier of the Far West.

Miss Edna Brundage of Modesto, Cal., selected a member of the California Legislature, a young woman legislator in the country. She is an attorney and is only twenty-six years of age.

Mrs. William Ish, of Findlay, Ohio, is a world beater as a beet copper, having recently pulled and tapped thirty-two tons which had in a sugar refinery in two weeks.

Ninety thousand Ontario (Canada) women signed the franchise petition in 1907 and are now eligible and fully qualified to vote for those who are to represent them in the Legislature.

Mrs. Ella Flagg Young, who for several years was head of the Chicago Red Cross, has joined the service and is one of the most famous woman educators in the country.

Arrangements have been made whereby the United States Girl Scout leaders will be trained by officials of the Boy Scouts.

Miss Estelle M. M. is rated as the highest department of the U.S. Naval School Navy Yard on the same basis as any man in the shop.

An eight hour day and a forty-four hour week with no night work for women is being demanded by the National Woman's Trade Council.

Miss Cecily Dunn-Webb, the first woman to go professional on the Pacific Coast, a daughter of Tom Dunn, the famous Scotch golfer.

Election returns show that throughout the country twenty-one women were elected to State Assemblies and one elected State Senator.

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
