In the World of Sport

PROFITS ABOUT \$100,000

For the Toledo Fight—Arena Sold for \$25,000.

Exactly 17,650 persons paid their way into the Bayview Park Arena, at Toledo, O., on July 4th to see the heavyweight championship bout between Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey.

Official figures as to attendance were announced by Frank B. Flournoy, Tex Rickard's associate in the venture.

The receipts after the Government tax of \$41,789.94 had been deducted were \$410,732.16.

The 7 per cent. charity fund for the City of Toledo was slightly under \$30,000. There were 292 policemen in the stadium, 75 firemen, 600 ushers, 90 ticket takers, 20 ticket sellers and 454 press representatives.

The principal expenses of the promoters were as follows: Willard, \$100,000; Dempsey, \$27,500; arena construction, \$150,000; City of Toledo charity fund, \$30,000; Total, \$307,500.

Other charges probably will make the cost approximately \$325,000, leaving the promoters' profits somewhat below \$100,000, Mr. Flournoy said.

The arena was constructed to seat 97,000. Flournoy announced that it would be sold to the American House Wrecking Company of Chicago, for \$25,000 being disposed of to the highest bidder.

There is nearly 2,000,000 feet of lumber in the plant. Work of tearing it down will begin at once.

A Disastrous Hockey Trip.

Probably the final chapter in the story of the trip of the Canadiens to the coast in quest of hockey honors has been written with the statement that Jack McDonald, forward of the Canadian Hockey Club, has been able to return to Montreal after a trying experience at Seattle, where he was sick with influenza and pneumonia. McDonald is still weak, it is stated, but he will probably be able to play hockey when the time comes next December.

"Babe" Ruth of Boston, on Saturday tied last season's American League record for home runs when he made his eleventh circuit drive. Boston winning the game from Chicago by 12 to 4. It was the first home run Ruth had made in Chicago since coming into the league. The game was a top hitting contest. Boston's 17 hits being good for 28 bases.

COULD NOT CALL WINNER.

So Referee Says in Statement Made at Toledo.

Oliver Pecord, referee of the Willard-Dempsey championship boxing exhibition at Toledo, Ohio, on July 4th, declined the details of an agreement he claimed to have been demanded by Jess Willard, to the effect that Pecord would not declare the winner if the bout went the 12-round limit.

Pecord asserted he affixed his signature to the agreement the day prior to the bout on the demand of Willard, who declared he would not enter the ring unless the decision was left in the hands of the judges alone.

Pecord declared that Willard, fearing a frame-up, notified Tex Rickard, promoter, that he would not go on with the fight until he was sure the Toledo official would consult with the judges before announcing any verdict.

It had been settled previously that Rickard and Major Bickie as judges would give the decision at the conclusion of the bout if it went the designed number of rounds. Should they disagree it was understood that Referee Pecord would agree with one or the other or give his own decision.

That a change from the original agreement as to procedure had been made was not known until Pecord divulged the information to-day.

McLuckie's Lucky Golf Ball.

Toronto Star: It is quite possible that the golf ball which William McLuckie, of Montreal, battered around the Lambton course last week to a Canadian championship, may figure in the winning of other honors, but by a new owner and not at the Royal and ancient game. Anyway, Alf Doherty of the Canadas, carried the golf ball around in his pocket Monday at Niagara-on-the-Lake and the W. K. Doherty rink, of which he is a member, got away to a good start on the opening day's play of the annual O. B. A. by defeating A. N. Longstreet rink from Woodstock, last year's trophy winners, by the one-sided score of 22 to 8. If that golf ball of McLuckie's gives the Doherty rink the same luck during the balance of the tournament, it is easy to guess the next holders of the O. B. A. trophy. Mr. Doherty was presented with the winning golf ball by McLuckie at the conclusion of his match with Turpin on Saturday, and he prizes it very much.

Break Off Relations.

All relations between the major and minor baseball leagues were definitely broken off at the meeting in New York of a committee representing the National Association of Minor Leagues.

The minor leagues will operate independently of the major leagues and will attempt to settle all disputes within their own organization, instead of appealing to the National Commission for final decision or review of any cases. The action of the minor league committee means that the major leagues will not be permitted to draft players, their contracts and territorial rights, however, will be respected.

Marathon Cycles Event.

The Libertyville, Ill., race meeting was declared off. Interference with mutual hitting by the Attorney-General and lack of sufficient attendance to make oral betting pay in the face of possible arrests under the state law against gambling were responsible for the action. The expenses were about \$21,000 and the receipts \$3,500 for the two days the meeting ran. The establishment was a crude country fair, one without conveniences or accommodations, to which an admission fee of \$2.75 was charged. It did not suit Chicagoans and would have died of inanition had there been no interference. General racing would have been much injured had the meeting continued and the sport is benefited by its death.
