**TO ERECT NEW BUILDING.**

On Barrack Street For New Gas Purifiers.

The Utilities Commission has taken no action on the tenders for extensions to the old gas works building. In fact it not deemed advisable to incur any considerable expense on old buildings and it is proposed to erect a new building on Barrack street to contain the new purifiers. This will be in the same block as the present building, but fronting on Barrack street. Plans and specifications are being prepared by Architect William Newlands. The building will be fifty by fifty feet. The whole matter will be considered by the Commission at a meeting to be held on Monday next.

The work of placing the steel lining in the gas holder to make it absolutely water tight is proceeding. The actual work on the iron is about finished and cement mixture is being used to prevent the water leaking into the tank. The sheet iron lining shows a tendency to bulge and efforts are being directed to correct it.
