 R. J. Wray's Belleville rink was victorious Wednesday afternoon in the big feature of the annual tournament of the St. Lawrence Bowling Association, at Prescott, winning out in the final for the Wiser cup by a score of 14 to 12 over H. W. Newman, of Kingston.

It was close all the way through and Newman, coming from behind, tied up the score on the 17th end. On the last end, however, Wray scored two and won out. IN MARINE CIRCLES.
Movements of Vessels In and About Kingston Harbor.

Rubber Prices and Tire Profits.
 The one great exception to the rule of advancing costs of raw materials is found in the crude rubber market.
 Strange as it may appear in these days of upward price trend, the cost of rubber has been going steadily downward for the past few years, and as the demand for tires has been steadily increasing, with consequent price advance for the finished product, excellent earnings have been made possible for all manufacturers of automobile tires.
 The average import prices quoted in the United States market for all grades of crude rubber combined show a decline from 84c per lb. in 1912 to 44c per lb. in 1913. The average import price thus for this year has been less than 30c.
 Such a remarkable condition in the face of war inflation of almost every other commodity, can only be attributed to the great increase in the world's production of rubber over the same period.
 This has grown from 66,031 lbs. in 1908 to the huge figure of 258,500 pounds in 1918.
 A veritable boom in plantation rubber started as far back as 1900 due to the widespread belief that the use of motor cars must inevitably bring about a big market for rubber. The acreage of rubber trees was vastly increased, production was thereby so increased as to bring about a rubber supply greater than even the tremendously increased consumption of tires could keep pace with.
 Even allowing for the possibility that this great excess of supply over demand may not be maintained, it is quite evident that for a long time to come the rubber companies will not have to pay as high for rubber supplies as they did in 1913.
