FINE PRICE OFFERED.

£50,000 For Flight India to South Africa. London, July 17.—The Daily Express offers a prize of £10,000, open to the whole world with the exception of the late enemy countries, for an air flight establishing communication on a commercial basis with India and South Africa. All competing machines must carry a cargo of at least one ton on both outward and homeward flights. Factors to be considered in the award will be the average reliability and air worthiness of the machines.

Waltz Given Higher Salary.

Watertown, N.Y., July 17.—Frank Waltz, former city treasurer, was re-appointed by Mayor Breen and his designation confirmed by the council at a salary of \$3,500 per year by a vote of eight to three. Aldermen Dorr and Lee voted against the confirmation and increase in salary of \$1,100 over the late H. J. Shook. Opposition was caused solely by the salary boost.

Legit. Gov. Summoned By Death.

Charlottetown, P.E.I., July 17.—Augustine Colin MacDonald, Lieutenant-governor of Prince Edward Island, died Wednesday afternoon after an illness of several months. He was eighty-nine years of age.

THE WORLD'S TIDINGS IN CONDENSED FORM

Tidings from All Over Told in a Pointed and Pithy Way. Kenneth Patterson, eight years old, was drowned at Brockville. The Italian legation to Belgium has been raised to the rank of embassy. The Bulgarian delegation, which is to receive the Allied terms, will arrive in Paris on July 25th. Former German dye-stuff agents are seeking to re-establish their control of the American markets. Ericus Teller, communist leader at Munich, has been sentenced to confinement for five years in a fortress. Some of the Swiss cantons, including Zurich, and Thurgau, have forbidden automobilism on Sunday. It is officially announced that the Prince of Wales will embark on the battleship Renown for Canada on Aug. 5th. Chatham Board of Education raised the salaries of teachers and voted a bonus of \$50 a month for four months. Mayor Church, Toronto, announces that he intends to take up with the Government shortly the acquisition of new armories for Toronto. Domestic positions for 300 Scotch girls have been secured in Canada. The first instalment of twenty-five to sail shortly, the remainder at intervals as accommodation permits. Approximately 175 ships, with an aggregate tonnage of more than 500,000 will constitute the newly organized Pacific fleet of the United States. The Saskatchewan Government will assist farmers in the crop failure areas to move into sections of the province and Manitoba where success is possible. The international charter of the machinists union No. 122, Canadian Pacific Railway, has been revoked because that lodge decided to throw in its lot with the one big union. Vienna despatches to the Paris Temps says the communists are preparing to repeat on July 21st the efforts in April and June to overthrow the Austrian Government. Eduardo Dato, former Spanish premier, has declined to form a ministry to take the place of that of Antonio Maura, the resignation of which was announced on Wednesday. The congregation of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church, New York, has voted to extend a call to the pastorate to Rev. Dr. John Kolman, pastor of Free St. George's church, Edinburgh, Scotland. Daylight saving will be repealed by the Brantford City Council shortly as a result of the vote against it in a referendum, the vote being 448 for a continuance of daylight saving and 726 against. Julius T. Mayer, resident director in America of the Hamburg-American line, has sailed for Germany to find out what is the status of the once great German steamship company. The bakers' strike in St. Catharines was settled, the schedule accepted being not up to the journey-men's demands, but higher than the employers offered, and the union being recognized. Cecil Harmsworth, under secretary of foreign affairs, told the British Commons on Wednesday that the Government was seriously contemplating the withdrawal of its navy from the Vatican. The death of Leon Demers, a hermit who lived in a shack in the woods near Shawbridge, Que., supporting himself by making axe handles was pronounced a case of murder by a coroner's jury. For refusing to give evidence during the inquest on a man killed at Winnipeg in the rioting of last month, A. Berrill has been placed under arrest, the coroner remarking such refusal was unprecedented. Five New York physicians and two druggists were held in heavy ball for trial when they were arraigned before United States Commissioner Hitchcock as the first result of the crusade started by the federal authorities against alleged traffickers in habit-forming drugs.
