AN HOTEL STOCK COMPANY

IS TO BE FORMED IN KINGSTON AT ONCE.

Five Hundred Thousand to Be Bought—Charter Is Asked For—Options Being Secured on Sites.

The civic hotel committee held a meeting on Wednesday evening and decided to ask the Ontario Government for a charter for a limited company. The amount of stock will be \$500,000. Fifteen directors are to be chosen by Ald. Peters and City Clerk Sands. The committee intends to proceed at once and sell stock for the erection of an hotel that is so much needed in Kingston and which it is assured will be a paying investment.

There is a good deal of money in Kingston that might be brought forth to help in this civic enterprise, for one thing Kingston must have an hotel that will take care of the travel that is passing the city by.

Ald. Peters, chairman of the committee, stated that he was sure the citizens would come in on the project. The business men are particularly interested and he looked for strong support from them. The City Council would also be asked to guarantee a certain amount of the bonds the company would issue. Options are being secured on several sites, and the committee hopes to have a definite announcement to make shortly.

Military News

The S.S. Royal George is due at Halifax on Sunday with one officer and forty-one other ranks; also forty-one convalescents for Kingston. The Essequibo is due at Portland on Tuesday with invalids for Kingston hospitals, including three officers, eight other ranks, three amputation cases, one insane, four cot cases, one officer, one nursing sister and twenty-two other ranks.

The Information Bureau at the Frontenac hotel will close on Saturday. After that date information may be obtained from Captain Parker, O. C. of the Army Service Corps, Tete de Pont Barracks.

Saturday will be observed as a holiday at district headquarters. When asked what programme was being arranged for the observance of the Saturday as the national day of thanksgiving for peace, Brig-Gen. Williams stated that he did not think that the men should be obliged to parade on a day such as that. He felt that all should be free to celebrate the occasion in any manner they saw fit. Two parades had already been held in celebrating peace, and it was determined to make the day a general holiday for military units.

ORDERED TO CLEAR STEAMER BROCKVILLE

Which is Entitled to Run on Sunday—Instructions Came From Ottawa.

Thomas Gaskin, acting collector of customs, has received word from the department at Ottawa, to clear the steamer Brockville at Kingston on Sundays, as the trip of this vessel is regarded as coming under the regulations concerning regular traffic. Last Sunday the trip of the Brockville had to be cancelled, as the customs would not clear the steamer, owing to some misunderstanding. Now, the matter has been righted and Kingston will have the benefit of the Brockville seven days a week.

FIREMEN GIVEN TEST

Inspector Wilson Making Inspection For Fire Underwriters.

The firemen were given a call from Box 12, at the corner of Wellington and Clarence streets, shortly after eleven o'clock on Thursday morning, and found on arrival at the scene that they had been summoned as a result of a visit here of Inspector Wilson, who is making a test on behalf of the fire underwriters. A big crowd assembled, being under the impression that there was a fire in the heart of the down-town section, and remained to watch the local firefighters through the usual tests.

Ald. P. B. Chow, chairman of the Fire and Light Committee, was called down to the city buildings to meet Mr. Wilson, and the latter then had him pull the box.

Mr. Wilson was interviewed by a Whig representative but stated that he had no information to give out about the test. He will submit his report later on to Mayor Newman.
