ASK FOR \$15,000 TO BUY PROPERTY

Board of Education Committee Will Wait on Civic Finance Committee.

The deputation will ask the committee for \$15,000 for the purchase of the property for the building of the new school, to take up the option which will expire on Sept. 1st.

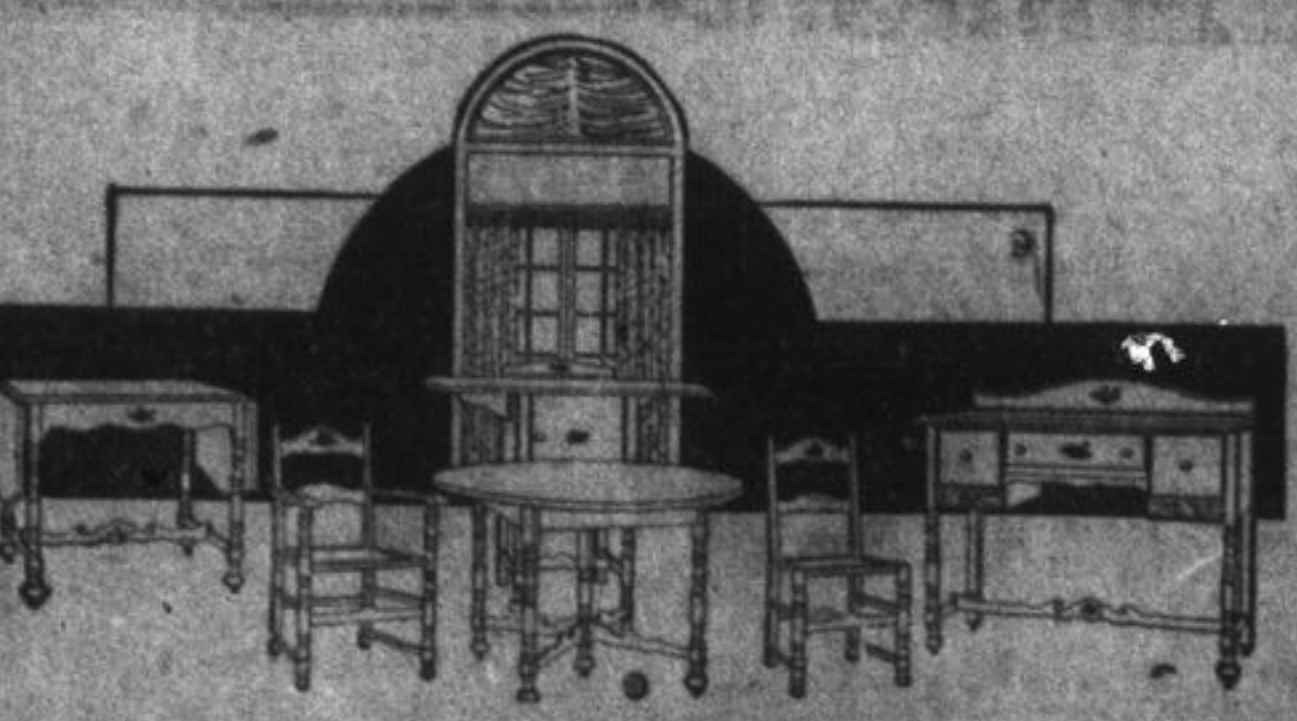
