The British Admiralty has placed contracts for salvage of the German warships sunk by their crews in Scapa Flow.

Holland will consent to the extradition of former Emperor William at the Hague, according to a Berlin despatch to Paris newspapers.

A six shilling increase in the price of coal, previously announced by the British government, will be effective July 21st, Bonar Law announces.

The steamer J. L. H. P. Morrow, from Cleveland to Montreal, with a cargo of coal, is ashore on Morgan's Point, about six miles west of Port Colborne.

**KILLED BY TRAIN SEEING FRIENDS OFF**

**Aged Glenagary Woman Fell Between Coach and Platform.**

Glen Robertson, Ont., July 18.—Mrs. Don. Duncan McDonald going to the G.T.R. station here, on Saturday morning, to see her daughter, Miss Kate McDonald, and two friends off, fell under the car wheels and was killed.

Mrs. McDonald had followed the travellers into the east-bound train to bid them adieu and was leaving her car when she slipped and fell between the coach and the station platform. At that moment the train started and she was killed by the moving wheels.

Mrs. McDonald was seventy years old. She is survived by her husband, by four daughters and four sons, some of whom are residents in Montreal.

**ANOTHER CONFERENCE FRIDAY AFTERNOON**

**Between the Locomotive Company President and the Metal Workers' Executive.**

An important conference is being held this afternoon between President Wallace of the Locomotive Company, who was called back to the city for the purpose, and the executive of the metal workers unions. The outcome of the negotiations is being anxiously watched by many citizens who are concerned over all matters affecting the welfare of the city and the industries that we have.

There are reports, that should a settlement of the strike be reached, there are many workmen that are lost to the city, having moved away during the last three weeks, and will not be inclined to return. Just how many have taken up employment elsewhere cannot be stated, but one of the employees estimated the number at two hundred. The loss in wages to employees alone is very large and cannot be made up before winter sets in. Many men are looking for a satisfactory outcome of the conference now in progress and an early return to work. Members of the executive committee are non-committal.


