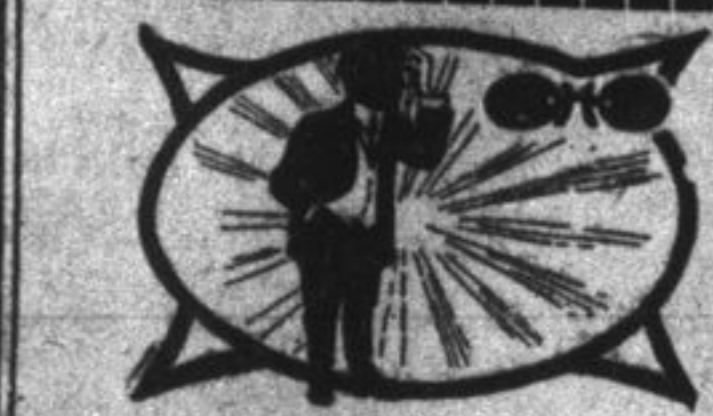

## THE VOICE OF THE PULPIT

### NEW PASTOR OF ZION CHURCH BEGINS PASTORATE.

Introduced by Rev. Dr. Macgillivray—Rev. M. W. Peck, Phoenix, Arizona, in Sydenham Street Methodist.  
Rev. Alexander Dunn, of Vancouver, commenced his pastorate at Zion Presbyterian Church on Sunday, succeeding Rev. J. D. Boyd, who has retired after long and faithful service.  
Rev. Dr. Malcolm Macgillivray conducted the service, and introduced the new pastor. There was a very large congregation, in spite of the warm weather. The new pastor addressed the members of the congregation briefly, after the introduction by Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, and preached at the evening service.  
Rev. Mr. Dunn is a man of pleasing appearance and a forceful speaker. He has been in the west some few years.  
Macgillivray, in his address, made a fitting reference to Rev. J. D. Boyd, who has labored at Zion Church for so many years, and expressed the hope that the church would continue to prosper under the guidance of the new pastor. The occasion marked a new era in the history of the church, and he appealed to the congregation to continue the good work.

At Chalmers Church.  
Rev. W. Taylor Dale, of Cooke's Church, officiated during July at the combined services of Cooke's and Chalmers congregations, is a most convincing and interesting preacher. At the morning service in Chalmers on Sunday he preached on the sovereignty of God, and in opening declared that the creed of the church is in need of revision. He had advocated this revision on every occasion he had the opportunity. A creed to be of any use must conform to present day conditions. Mr. Dale said that in accepting men and women to church membership one should not bother about their baptism certificates, but the question should be, "What think ye of Christ?" He had no sympathy with those who were ever lamenting that the world is growing worse. It is not, he declared. The world is getting better all the time, and "God is marching on."

Sydenham Street Methodist.  
Rev. Harcourt Peck, pastor of the First M. E. Church, Phoenix, Arizona, was the special preacher at Sydenham Street Methodist Church on Sunday morning. He told of the great centenary movement being carried on by the combined Methodist churches in the United States as the most fitting celebration of the centenary of Methodist missionary effort. The aim was to secure \$105,000,000, and the amount actually raised was \$115,000,000. This money will be used in establishing community centers in large cities and other areas where there is a predominance of new Americans, and the work will be religious, educational, social and Americanization. Rev. Mr. Peck has a church with a membership of two thousand people, and he has asked for an appropriation of \$250,000 for work in Phoenix, which includes the erection of a Protestant hospital. There are in his city 8,000 Mexicans. In the report of a committee of doctors it was estimated that the city in Phoenix has 3,000 to 5,000 tubercular patients, ninety-five per cent. of whom are from the east and middle west, but the state is not financially able to erect and maintain the necessary sanatoria.  
Mr. Peck was born at Lansdowne, and was a son of the late Rev. William Peck. After graduating from Victoria College and the Boston Theological College he went as a missionary to Honolulu. He said that the diversity of nationalities in the United States presents an enormous problem, and the Methodist Church, while not neglecting the foreign field, is committed to a definite programme of domestic missionary work of vast proportions.

A Popular Island Resort.  
The Island House, Wolfe Island, is becoming a very popular resort. J. S. Briceland, the proprietor, has made many improvements for the accommodation of transients and others, which are keenly appreciated by persons who desire to spend a day or the week-end on the island. Many persons, it is stated, who come into the city during the day go over on the ferry Wolfe Islander and spend the night at the Island House, coming back to the city on the morning boat. The arrangements has been found very satisfactory, for it enables them to escape the heat of the city during the night, and yet get back in the morning in time for business.
