### ATTACHMENT WRITS ISSUED

AGAINST TWELVE CATHOLIC PRIESTS OF THE DIOCESE.

Archbishop Spratt's Catechism May Be Used to Provide Funds to Carry the Appeal to the Privy Council.

Judge H. A. Lavell has ordered that attachment orders be issued against the following Catholic priests of this diocese: Right Rev. Charles B. Murray, Belleville; Right Rev. John Masterson, Prescott; Rev. C. J. Kileen, Belleville; Rev. John T. Hogan, Perth; Rev. T. A. Kelly, Smith's Falls; Rev. John Connolly, Trenton; Rev. Alexander Carson, Picton; Rev. J. T. Hartigan, Deseronto; Rev. Thomas McCarthy, Reid; Rev. T. P. O'Connor, Napanee; Rev. John P. Kehoe, Gananoque, and Rev. M. Maher, Marysville.

The contention made by A. B. Cunningham, counsel for Sister Mary Basil, on whose behalf the proceedings are being taken to secure the judgment for \$20,000 against Archbishop Spratt and Mother St. Regis of the House of Providence for alleged abduction, is that the archbishop is supported by catechism or a tax of ten per cent. levied upon such parish revenues as are raised for Christmas and Easter donations, and marriage, funeral and baptismal fees. It is the duty of the parish priest to collect these dues and once a year to pay the catechism to the archbishop for maintenance and support.

It is for the purpose of securing these dues that the attachment orders have been issued and the moneys cannot now be paid over by the priests of the diocese whose names are given until the orders are sustained or revoked.

Mr. Cunningham is endeavoring to secure the fulfillment of the judgment to satisfy Sister Basil's claims and the examination of the archbishop which was proceeding on Wednesday afternoon was to ascertain his assets to meet the judgment against him. The attachments have been made to assure counsel for Sister Mary Basil of sufficient funds if a decision is made to carry the case to the judicial committee of the Privy Council—the final court of appeal for the British Empire—which is a very expensive proceeding. If her full claims are not met by the defendants in the case it is the determination of Sister Basil and her counsel to carry her appeal to the highest court to seek the restoration of the original judgment pronounced by Justice Britton after hearing the case in Kingston and which was changed unfavorably to Sister Mary Basil on appeal to Toronto. In that case the expense will be provided by the catechism against which the writs of attachment have been issued.

### NEW APARTMENT HOUSE TO BE BUILT IN CITY

Mica Works to Be Renovated For Nine Apartments.

Kingston is to have another modern apartment house in the centre of the city by January 1st, 1920, if present plans materialize. A group of local men have organized a company and the mica works building on Brock street, at Sydenham street, owned by the Hotel Dieu and leased by Kené Bros. has been purchased for the purpose. It is the intention of the promoters to overhaul the building thoroughly and have nine apartments ready for occupancy by the first of next year.

The mica works will be transferred to the storehouse now owned by McKelvey and Birch Ltd., at Gore street, and just as soon as the machinery has been installed there the Brock street building will be put into shape. It is a fine stone building located in the residential part of the city and yet only a block from Princess street and a short distance from the business portion of the city. The site is ideal for such a building and the members of the company are confident that their venture will be a success.

One of the promoters stated that the purchase had been completed and that although Kené Bros. hold a lease on the building until the first of the year they were quite content to move their works to the Gore street building and permit immediate renovation of the present factory.

### Military News

Lieut. Col. F. L. Vaux, of the Canadian Postmaster Army Medical Corps, a native of Brockville, has been detailed to perform the duties, temporarily, of assistant director of medical services, Military District No. 12, with headquarters at Regina, Sask.

The troop train from the Royal George, with eighty men of all ranks, reached the city via G.T.R. at 9 p.m. on Tuesday. There were a few convalescents in the number. Mayor H. W. Newman was on hand to welcome them on behalf of the citizens of Kingston and spoke very feelingly of those who fought and suffered and endured calling forth the deepest gratitude of the people of Canada. He was loudly cheered by the men at the conclusion of his address. The party was conveyed to Barrisfield, where the men were discharged.

The interned German, Austrian and Turk prisoners at the Kapuskasing internment camp are being deported in groups back to their own countries. They are sent to England from Canada, and within a week of their arrival there they are in their own territory. There are still about 600 to be removed before the camp will be closed up. Capt. Kirkconnell, quartermaster, has left the staff and gone to his home in Lindsay. He will resume his studies and intends taking a degree at Harvard.

Three cases are being tried by court-martial, one of them being that of Pte. Ray Baldwin for desertion.

Lieut. S. Jordan, who was injured in the G.T.R. wreck near Belleville about a month ago, and was taken to the General Hospital for treatment, is reported making good progress toward recovery, but is not expected to return to his home for some time yet.
