COMMANDER ROSS TUCKS AWAY COIN.

With the racing season about half over, J. K. L. Ross, who has one of the best stables in America, again promises to be the greatest money winner on the turf for the year through the earnings of his horses in stake events. The Canadian sportsman now tops the list far out in front of the other prominent horse owners, and he will take a number of important victories by horses from other stables to bring his own up to the figure he has already reached.

This is due chiefly to the winnings of the great Sir Barton, which sprang to this season, as a sensation in the three-year-old division without having been accounted a great two-year-old. The victor of the son of Old Star shot in the Kentucky Derby, the Stake, the Pelmon, and the Stakes have brought to Mr. Ross no less than \$65,000, which is not taking into account the winnings from other horses in his stable.

Military Baseball Rules

Kingston, July 24, '19.—(To the Editor)—As secretary of the Military Baseball League, I cannot allow to pass without correction the erroneous statement made by your correspondent, F. E. Ansfield, in last evening's issue. Mr. Ansfield states that under Military League rules no man is allowed to play unless he has been overseas. This is not true, as it distinctly states in the minutes of the league that all players must be either a member or ex-member of the C. E. F., permanent force or imperial force. Surely this permits any man who has ever donned the King's uniform to be eligible to play, whether he has seen overseas service or not. It is upon this misapprehension of the rules that your correspondent bases his assertion that some teams in the Military League are not playing the game. It would be hard to find another league where such good comradeship, clean sportsmanship and keen rivalry is so evident. The rules of the league were drawn up by representatives from the teams participating in the league, and if they are not satisfactory then the teams have only themselves to blame.

I agree with Mr. Ansfield that the G. W. V. A. deserve credit for winning the game last week, but think that he would have been wiser to have secured his information regarding the rules of the league from the league executive rather than from an unreliable source before bringing the matter to the press. Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for this space in your excellent paper.
