Top-notch Prices Prevailed in Almost Everything Offered-Prices in the Various Lines.

The market on Saturday morning edies, at Pickeringswas a very busy one, large supplies being on and to cope with the demands of the crowds of purchasers. Stop—read about— the Appreciation Sale of The Veterans Clothing previous weeks, although fresh vegetables were very plentiful. In the inner market butter sold at 60c a pound, while eggs went at 50c and 55c per dozen. Fowls and shickens were also plentiful. The former sold at \$1.50 to \$2 each, while the chickens ranged from 75c to \$1.25.

In the meat section, the supply was short. Veal sold at 20c a pound for forequarters, and 25c a pound for hinds. Mutton/was high at 30c to 35c a pound, and lamb reached the top-notch prices of 35c a pound for fronts and 40c a pound for hindguarters.

The biggest business was done in the vegetable section, where every wagon was well loaded with supplies of fresh vegetables. The first tomatoes of the season sold at approximately 13c a pound, while the first sale of The Veterans Clothing com-
