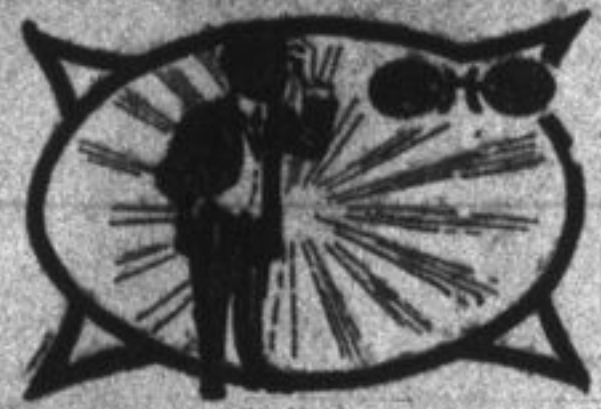

### BIG SUPPLY OF VEGETABLES

FEATURED THE OFFERING ON THE MARKET ON SATURDAY.

Top-notch Prices Prevailed in Almost Everything Offered—Prices in the Various Lines.

The market on Saturday morning was a very busy one, large supplies being on hand to cope with the demands of the crowds of purchasers. Prices were a little lower than in previous weeks, although fresh vegetables were very plentiful. In the inner market butter sold at 80c a pound, while eggs went at 50c and 55c per dozen. Poultry and chickens were also plentiful. The former sold at \$1.50 to \$2 each, while the chickens ranged from 75c to \$1.25.

In the meat section, the supply was short. Veal sold at 20c a pound for forequarters, and 25c a pound for hind. Mutton was high at 30c to 35c a pound, and lamb reached the top-notch prices of 35c a pound for fronts and 40c a pound for hindquarters.

The biggest business was done in the vegetable section, where every wagon was well loaded with supplies of fresh vegetables. The first tomatoes of the season sold at approximately 13c a pound, while the first cobs of corn went at 35c and 40c a dozen. Onions, radishes and lettuce sold at 5c a bunch, the latter at 8c a bunch or two bunches for 15c, and carrots and beets sold at 10c a bunch. Cabbages were from 15c to 20c each, and cucumbers 10c and 15c. Beans and peas saw a drop in price, beans being 5c a quart and peas 12 1/2c. New potatoes were plentiful and sold at 6c a peck.

In the fruit section, early apples made their appearance and sold at \$1 a peck. Raspberries were 25c to 35c a box, black currants were 35c, and gooseberries sold at 25c a quart. The raspberries were of poor quality, so that the price was high.

### TWO INSPECTORS FOR PENITENTIARY

Gilbert Smith and H. C. Fatt Selected For the Positions.

It was learned here on Saturday that the two penitentiary inspectors, who will work under Chief Inspector W. S. Hughes, have been selected. They are Gilbert Smith and H. C. Fatt. The former is a clerk in the office of the inspector, at Ottawa, and the latter has been acting as an accountant at the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary.

### HAS BEEN TRAVELLING SOME.

Ex-Mayor Hughes Home After Another Trip.

Ex-Mayor J. M. Hughes has been doing some travelling. He just recently returned from a trip overseas, and after being home but a day or so, he started on a trip to Kansas, in the interests of his business. He has arrived home again and is on the job.

Speaking about conditions, when he was overseas, Mr. Hughes stated that we in Canada did not know there had been a war, as compared with the people over there, as in certain places it was absolutely impossible to get the luxuries they were able to get here, and this was all due to the war. But in spite of these conditions the people continued to smile and were ready to meet any emergency.

W.L.S. in Farming. The limitless expanse of the prairie has an appeal of its own, but it falls in time, while here, with our hills and streams, our woodlands and cultivated fields, our orchards and roadside trees, there is a variety that never grows old. We may not gain the sudden wealth that comes with one bumper crop of wheat, but we do not have the feverish anxiety, lasting from early spring to late fall, that goes with dependence on one main crop. Neither is there with us a total loss when one crop fails.

There may be a better place to live than in the Mother Province of Confederation but one would have to travel a long way to find it.

### GETTING MIXED UP.

W. J. McKendry, Glenburnie, Not Pleased Over Treatment. Since Ald. G. J. Graham superceded the city engineer, the technical officials who had planned to carry out the street building programme authorized by council, things are getting rather mixed up, according to W. J. McKendry, of Glenburnie.

In the spring the city engineer called for tenders for asphalt sand and accepted the tender submitted by Mr. McKendry, whose cheque for \$50 accompanied his tender. Mr. McKendry ordered him to deliver 600 yards of sand, the articles of contract in the meantime being prepared for signature. Mr. McKendry arranged to make delivery in accordance with his tender and did deliver some 200 yards. Then Mr. Graham came upon the scene and ordered him to stop delivery, but demanded that he sign the contract. Mr. McKendry asked that his cheque be returned to him, but Mr. Graham demanded that he not sign the contract. This Mr. McKendry was willing to do if given any assurance that delivery of the sand would be taken during the summer months, when he was prepared to deliver it and not late in the fall or winter when the roads became impassable owing to the breaking up of the weather. Mr. Graham declined to say when he would take delivery, but demanded that the contract be signed before he returned the cheque. In the meantime Mr. McKendry's cheque for \$50 is being held and he feels that he is not being properly treated by Ald. Graham.
