THE LATEST BOXING DOPE

JIMMY WILDE IS LIKELY TO COME TO AMERICA.

Pal Moore Wants Another Bout With the Champion—Dempsey Has Not Made Definite Answer About the Big Bout.

Jimmy Wilde, the British flyweight marvel, wants to go to the United States and "make a clean-up" of dollars. Therefore, it is not likely that Pal Moore and the little champion will meet in London again soon, although Nate Lewis, manager of Moore, has asked for the match and received the sanction of Promoter C. B. Cochran, who staged the recent bout between the boys.

Lewis offered to contribute \$2,500 to a charitable institution if Wilde would consent to another match, and Cochran seized on the opportunity of bringing them together again, but Wilde is holding out. Cochran is still dickering with Wilde.

Walter Ross, the British bantamweight champion, has been matched with Moore, Lewis announced recently. They will battle within the next three weeks for a side bet of \$2,500.

Cochran announced that total receipts of the Wilde-Moore bout amounted to \$95,000.

Wilde's proposed trip to the United States does not include the possibility of meeting Pete Herrman, world's bantamweight champion, because he holds Herrman cannot make 116 pounds ringside.

The proposed match between Jack Dempsey and the winner of the Carpenter-Beckett bout is still hanging fire. Cochran says he has obtained signatures of Carpenter and Beckett, but that Dempsey has not definitely made an answer. Cochran's American agent is said to have deposited \$50,000 in New York to be transferred to Dempsey when he signs articles. Cochran said yesterday he had received word from the United States that the deal for Dempsey was nearing completion. It is expected Dempsey would make his appearance in England in the famous Olympia Hall which can seat 30,000 persons. Admission would range from \$5 to \$125.

Better Go To Toronto Where Life is Quiet.

Urban Shocker, Detroit pitcher with the St. Louis Browns, must pay \$325 back alimony and attorney fees before August 2nd. Judge Clyde L. Webster so ruled. When Shocker's wife, Minerva, appeared in court complaining that Shocker had fallen behind \$450 in his payments, which were to be \$50 a week.

If Shocker makes good his delinquency his alimony payments after August 1st will be only \$25 a week, the court said.

Shocker says he is \$1,000 in debt, but his salary with the Browns is \$500 a month. He must be leading a gay life at that rate.

Another American boxer may soon cross the Atlantic to take a crack at Jimmy Wilde. The young man in question is Frankie Mason, of Fort Wayne, who claims to have beaten Pal Moore in a ten-round bout.

Mason, who is at present in Baltimore, declares that he has received an offer from the National Sporting Club of London for a twenty-round bout with the little Briton, and adds that he probably will accept.

Another report says that Wilde is coming to America for "big" money. Perhaps he'll get it and perhaps he'll get a plum off an apple tree. Flyweights are all right for "them as likes 'em."

His latest sensational performance when he won in straight heats at Toledo on Monday was a remarkable testimony to the wearing qualities of the son of Anderson Wilkes, now nine years old, and raced almost continuously since he was a two-year-old. At Kalamazoo he readily disposed of Murphy and Directum J., but he had a new and redoubtable opponent in his race on Monday. This was the Peter the Great mare, Miss Harris M., who gave Single G. such a great struggle at Toledo last year, and was making her first appearance this season. She proved no more formidable than the opposition the stallion had already been disposing of so far as ability to beat him is concerned. He went three heats in front, the second in 1.59 1/2, and the third in 2.00 1/2, the mare being second in both. The last of the second heat was paced in 59 1/2 seconds. 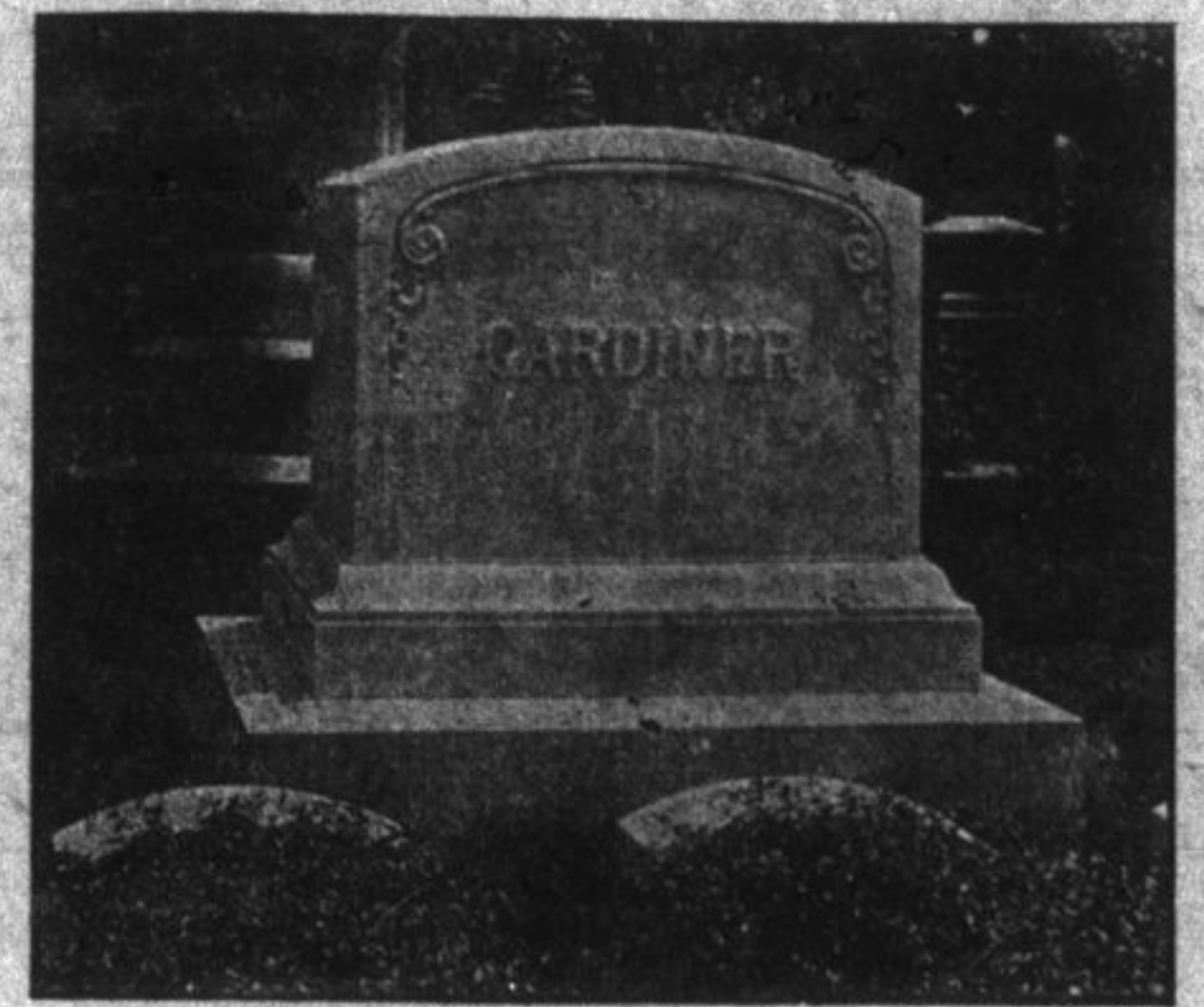
