TWO DROWNED WHILE CANOEING

A Third Was Saved After a Very Perilous Time in Water.

NAVIGATING AT LOUGHBORO

SADNESS BROUGHT TO TWO HOMES IN KINGSTON.

Young Men in the Pride of Youth Were Suddenly Cut Off During a Trochous Squall—Their Bodies Were Not Recovered.

A sad drowning accident occurred at noon on Sunday when Clifton Drury and William Eason lost their lives on the overturning of their canoe in Hughes' Bay, Loughboro Lake. Sterling Gibson, son of Dr. Gibson, Barris street, swam to the shore and was in an exhausted condition.

The three lads left the city in a canoe on Saturday afternoon to spend a couple of days at Loughboro. They paddled up the Rideau and all were in excellent health and high spirits. The news of the drowning was received in the city soon after noon and caused a shock to the families and friends. All of the lads were popular in school, church and sporting circles, and the sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved families.

William Eason was nineteen years of age, a son of Mrs. William Eason, 57 Coburn street. The lad was in first year science at Queen's. Besides his mother, who is a widow, he is survived by one brother, James, just returned from overseas, and two sisters, Elsie and Catherine. Another brother, John, was killed in action at the front after the college had closed. William took up work for the holidays at the shipyard.

Clifton Drury was the youngest son of . . . in Drury, Queen street. He was eighteen years of age and was in fourth form at the Collegiate Institute. Besides his parents he was survived by two brothers, Prof. C. W. Drury, Queen's; Alfred, who is surveying in the west; and two sisters, Mrs. McDonald, of Kingston, and Olive at home. He took the matriculation examinations two weeks ago.

Sterling Gibson, the third member of the party, when he reached home, said that at the time of the accident the canoe was a long distance from shore. It was upset by a storm that came up suddenly. The lads took hold of the canoe and were swimming with it to shore, but gradually they were being overcome by a number of the tower limbs.

About 100 yards from shore Drury took a cramp, and the others tried to help him. He and Eason sank and Gibson was barely able to reach the shore, in fact the strength had gone from his leg, but he paddled with his hands.

James Reid's ambulance was called and efforts were made to recover the bodies on Sunday afternoon and evening but without success. The water was reported to be ten feet deep and full of weeds at the point where they sank. On Monday grappling operations were resumed.

All day Monday efforts were made to recover the bodies of the two lads, and every assistance was given to William Drury, who directed the work. All available boats belonging to campers and visitors at Batterssea were used, but without success. It was found that the water was fourteen feet deep at the spot where they sank, the bottom consisted of soft mud about four feet deep and the weeds are thick. Late in the afternoon four charges of dynamite were used. It is thought that in about three or four days the bodies will rise to the surface and a watch will be kept about the locality.

The waterworks department is putting in a main on King street, near the tower.


The chambers taken from the buildings torn down in the market square, though seventy years old, are as sound as new material.

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
