DEATH OF YOUNG GIRL.

Miss Helen McLean Passed Away While Enjoying Her Vacation.

On Wednesday afternoon word was received of the death at Beaver Lake of Helen Mary Maclean, only daughter of Andrew Maclean, jr., 53 King street. Her death came with startling suddenness while surrounded by a number of her school friends in the summer house at Beaver Lake, near Tamworth, and about forty-two miles from Kingston.

Two weeks ago the deceased went to the camp with about fifteen of her young friends, and it was thought to be trivial, and he returned to the city in the afternoon. On Wednesday morning word came to him of her dangerous illness, and he left at once for Beaver Lake with an ambulance. Dr. O'Connell, of Tamworth, attended her on Monday, but found no dangerous symptoms, and dissuaded her friends from informing her father. On Wednesday two other doctors were called in consultation, and everything possible was done, but she passed away at 11.50 a.m., just before her father arrived, death having been due to heart failure. Her death was a shock to him, and the sympathy of the city goes to him in his sad bereavement.

Helen was sixteen years of age, and besides being a clever scholar, she was an accomplished musician and one of the best young lady swimmers in the city. After entering the Collegiate Institute she passed through the forms without having to take an examination, obtaining the fourth or matriculation form in June last. She possessed a most sweet and amiable disposition, and was popular wherever she went. Besides her father, she is survived by one brother, Andrew.

THOMAS POLLITT VERY ILL.

Former Mariner Has Suffered An Attack of Pneumonia.

Thomas Pollitt, a former employee of the Montreal Transportation Co., residing at 34 Ellice street, who joined the King's merchant marine soon after the outbreak of the war, is reported to be seriously ill in Italy after an attack of pneumonia. His mother, Mrs. R. Pollitt, 38 Lower Charles street, received a card from Mrs. L. Howes, Leghorn, Italy, intimating that he was not making the progress expected but that everything possible was being done for his comfort. Mr. Pollitt was torpedoed three times during the war and on the last occasion was in the water for forty-eight hours before being rescued.

Hospital Being Cleared.

Already considerable progress has been made in evacuating Queen's Military Hospital and it is expected that the building will be ready for the accommodation of university students just as soon as Sydenham Military Hospital is ready for occupation. Wards 48 and 49, in Grant Hall, in which were accommodated over one hundred convalescents, has been emptied and the hospital fixtures are being dismantled. The patients have been transferred to the hospital huts at Barrfield in charge of Capt. Tucker and Capt. Kidd and several nurses are also in attendance.

A Gunner's Good Work.

Gunner Kingham did some heroic work on Wednesday, in stopping a runaway team. The horses were attached to one of the city's waste wagons and they dashed up Brock street. Kingham on horseback, grasped the reins of the frightened horses and guided them safely to Nelson street and then turned them into a vacant lot where they were stopped and without any damage being done. 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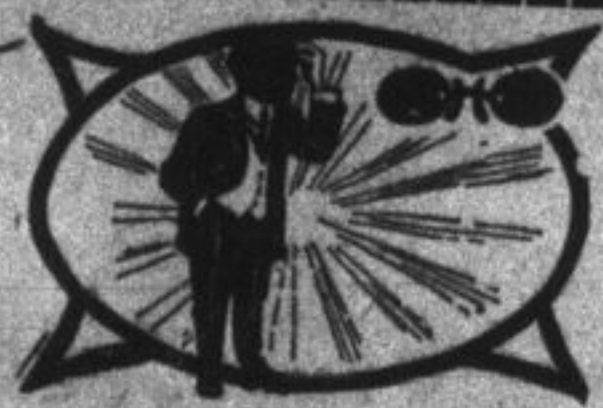

WOMAN IS ELECTED Mrs. M. O. Ramsland Succeeds Husband in Saskatchewan Kamsack, Sask., July 31.—Mrs. M. O. Ramsland, the Government candidate, was elected to the Provincial Legislature from the electoral district of Pelly by a majority of 252, with ten polls to hear from, which, it is claimed, will increase her majority. She is the first woman to be elected to this Legislature, and the second to contest a seat. Her opponent, Mr. Whelan, was a returned soldier, who ran as an independent. The contest was a by-election caused by the death of Mr. M. O. Ramsland, late husband of the successful candidate.

Belleville Rate 38 3-10 Mills. Belleville, July 31.—The tax rate of this city for the year will be 38 3-10 mills, compared with 35 1-10 mills last year. The total amount required to meet the obligations of the city is \$306,922.46. The increase this year is in the general and High School rates, the latter caused by increase in salary and addition to the teaching staff.

Giving up Practice. Belleville, July 31.—Dr. Platt, Mayor of Belleville, has disposed of his medical practice here to Dr. S. Cronk, Kingston, also his residence and household effects, and purposes taking up special studies in medicine possibly overseas. His plans in this respect have not been matured yet. His term as mayor being well advanced, he may not resign, but accept a leave of absence.

The death occurred on July 15th at Vancouver, B.C., of George Goldsmith Percival, Mission City, B.C. Deceased was a son of the late William Percival, Unionville, now Fort-ton, and was born Oct. 15th, 1848. Harry Donaldson, Madoc, is the new manager of the Beaver and Kirkland Lake Mines, Cobalt, succeeding L. W. Ledyard, resigned.
