### RED SOX OUTCLASSED

FAILED TO MEASURE UP TO EXPECTATIONS ON SATURDAY

Red Sox were outclassed again in a scheduled game of the City League at the Cricket Field on Saturday afternoon before a fair attendance. Athletics defeated them by a score of 17 to 7 and though the losers showed signs of revival in some of the innings the Athletics were never in danger of defeat. Palmer's sports were handicapped by having neither Partell, nor Derry, the regular twirlers, in the box, but even with this advantage the Red Sox could not break into the win column. Spoor and Spencer handled the ball very well, considering the fact that both were playing out of their regular positions, but with the usual pitchers it is certain that the Red Sox would have had a more overwhelming defeat.

Runs were chalked up in every inning except the third by the Athletics, and only in the sixth and seventh innings did "Garrie's" cube show signs of animation. In the former innings Chadwick, Stagg and George trotted around on singles, but the first was called at the home plate. The latter two, however, passed over on a double to Briceland, what showed unusual hitting ability during the game. Hughes was struck out, but Briceland scored on a single of Reid. 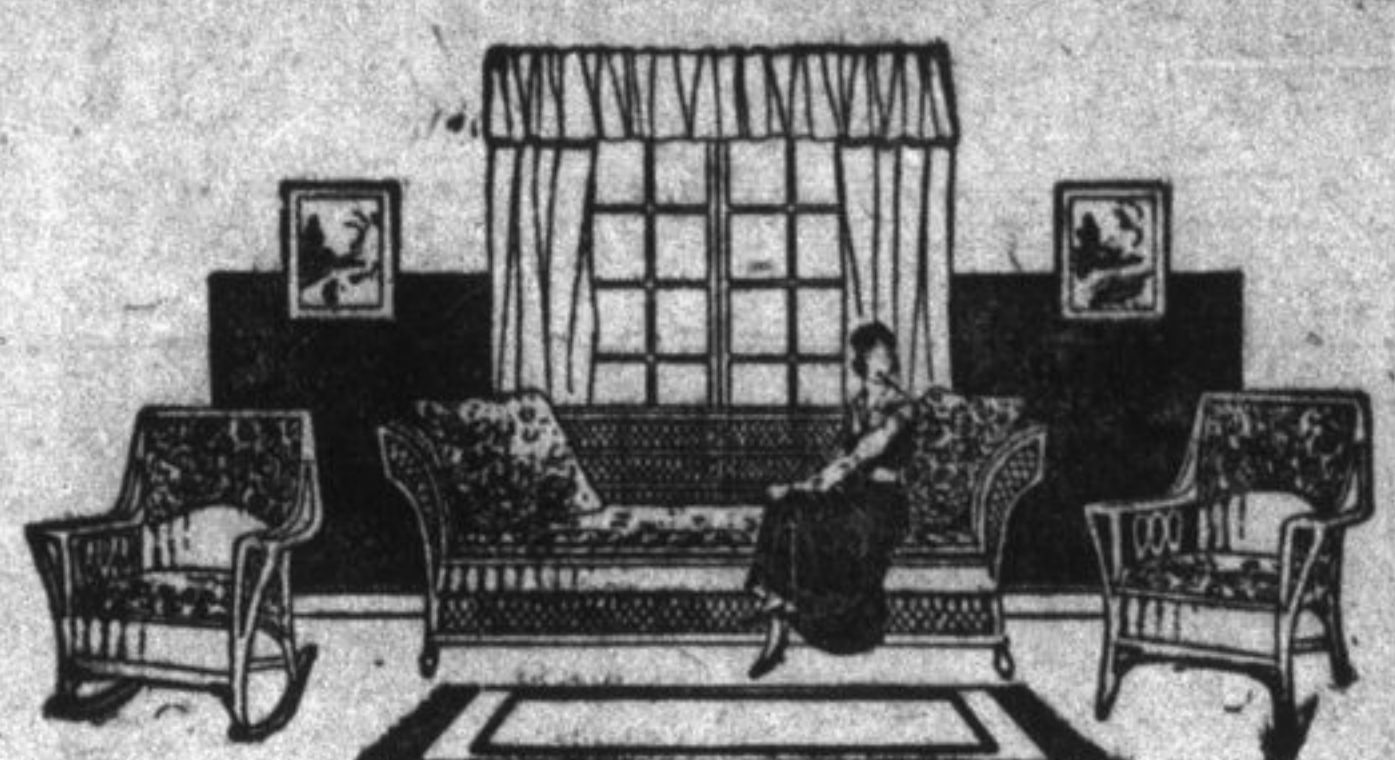

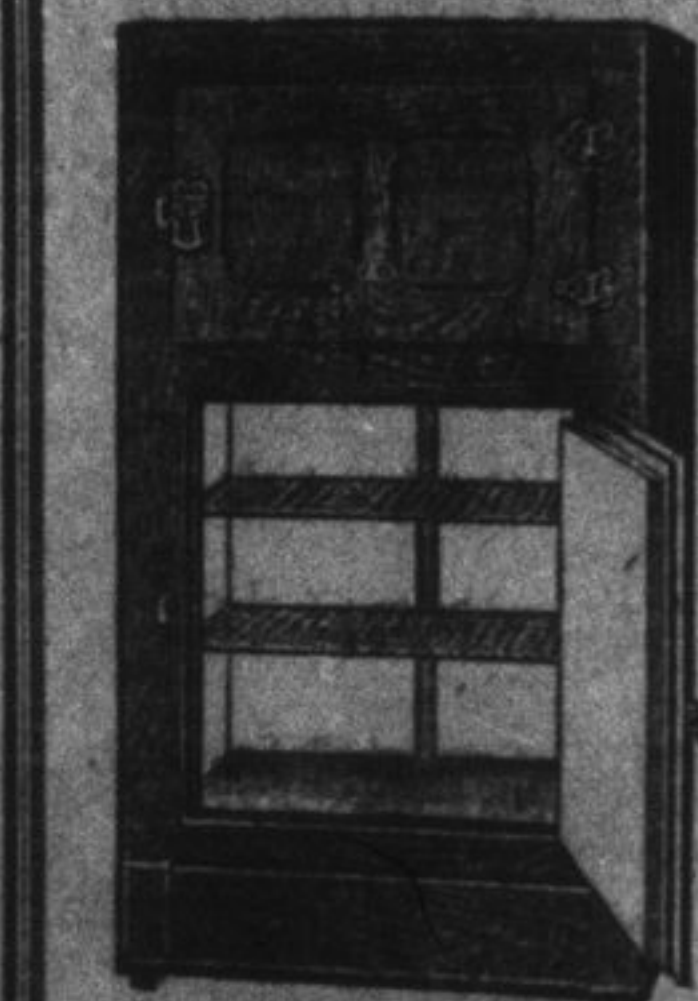
