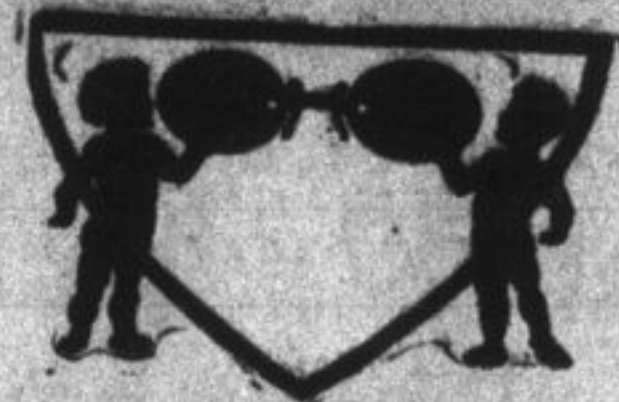

WAR MEMORIAL QUESTION

WILL BE DISCUSSED AT A MEETING IN PORTSMOUTH.

Matter Was Again Under Discussion at Meeting of the Village Council Monday Night—John Mills Appointed Tax Collector.

The question of a war memorial was under discussion again at a meeting of the Portsmouth Council, held on Monday night, and it was decided to hold a public meeting in the village hall on Tuesday evening next, August 12th, for the purpose of receiving the views of the people. The Council has a proposition to put before the people.

It was decided to construct a concrete walk on Front street from Main to Mowat avenue, provided the cost is not too excessive.

John Mills was appointed tax collector in the place of James McMaster, deceased.

The matter of the appointment of a new constable was laid over. Portsmouth is a law-abiding place, and it is felt that the village can get along without the services of a constable. It is the intention to have the caretaker of the village hall act as constable in case of necessity.

Reeve James Halliday presided at the meeting, and the councillors present were Messrs. Bailden, Kennedy, Marks and Clark.

Former Kingstonian Dead.

William J. Sumnerby, a school inspector, died in Paris on Sunday. Deceased was for a number of years principal of Wellington (now Sydenham) school in this city. He was regarded as an extremely efficient teacher. Deceased was in his seventy-third year, was in Paris the previous day, and shortly after returning was stricken with apoplexy, from which he passed away, never rallying. After leaving Kingston he was appointed Public School Inspector for the counties of Russell and Prescott, which position he filled for over thirty years. Since then he had ably occupied the position of Bilingual Inspector of all such schools in the Province of Ontario, except at Ottawa.

He was married forty-five years ago to Miss Rumina Roucke of Russell township, who, with two sons, William L., on the Alberta teaching staff, and C. Herbert, at home, and two daughters, Miss Fred of the Haliburton teaching staff, and Miss Frances, at home, survive him.

PASSED AWAY ON MONDAY

JOHN HALLIDAY, CUSHENDALL, SUFFERED A FRACTURED SKULL.

He Was Thrown From a Rig While Driving on the Gananoque Road, Six Miles from the City.

Unconscious to the last, John Halliday, Cushendall, who was thrown from his rig by a runaway horse on Monday night, passed away at the Hotel Dieu six hours after his admission. The deceased was driving to the city with Mrs. Foster, also of Cushendall, and on the Gananoque road, six miles from Kingston, the horse took fright and ran away, overturning the rig. The occupants were thrown out, and Mr. Halliday sustained a fracture of the skull. Dr. Robert Hanley was summoned, and had the injured man removed to the Hotel Dieu by R. J. Reid's motor ambulance. He never regained consciousness, and his death was due to concussion of the brain. Mr. Halliday was thirty years of age, single, and operated a farm at Cushendall. He had no relatives. Mrs. Foster was unharmed.
