IS A MOMENTOUS EVENT

THE LIBERAL GATHERING IN OTTAWA THIS WEEK.

Statements by One of the Delegates Who Has Returned to the City—The Dominant Note Was to Get Together.

J. R. Forster, 201 William street, returned to the city to-day from Ottawa, where he attended the National Liberal Convention as one of Kingston's delegates. He declared that the great convention was one of the most momentous events in the history of Canada since Confederation. There were present delegates from the Yukon to Cape Breton. Among them were eight provincial premiers, Premier Murray of Nova Scotia; Premier Foster, New Brunswick; Premier-elect Bell, of Prince Edward Island; Premier Gouin, of Quebec; Premier Norris, of Manitoba; Premier Martin, of Saskatchewan; Premier Stewart, of Alberta; and Premier Oliver, of British Columbia.

The delegates numbered over 1,700, and the Ottawa Exhibition grounds, where the meetings took place, resembled Kingston's fair. A band played from the band stand all day and during the evening; meals were served on the grounds, and over five hundred of the delegates would not get hotel accommodation. They were provided with beds in the administration building.

The dominant note of the convention, and one that was carried into all deliberations, was "get together," and the noble manner in which Quebec gave her whole-hearted support to the English-speaking leaders warmed the hearts of all. There was no thought of self-interest except during the debate in committee over the tariff. Here the west and the manufacturer of the east met and debated the question from noon on Tuesday until noon on Wednesday. Here the principle of Liberalism was repeatedly enunciated and carried into effect in the tariff resolution which declared that the welfare and prosperity of the people of Canada, who are everywhere suffering from the high cost of the necessities of life, will best be served by a low tariff. To this and all implements and machinery required in the development of natural resources are made free, including farm, lumbering and mining machinery and parts thereof, wheat and wheat products, gasoline, clothing, grade and fuel oil, etc. Tariff shall be for revenue only. The delegates from the west wanted absolute free trade, but gave in their support to the resolution as they recognized that the manufacturers of the east were entitled to consideration. They did not do so, however, until a clause was added stating that the Liberal party pledged itself to enact legislation carrying the resolution into effect when returned to power. The committee was composed of 110 delegates representative of every business interest in the country, and the resolution was carried almost unanimously. The Ontario delegates pleaded for relief for the workingman and the common people of this province, and the resolution adopted was considered as meeting the requirements of all. The Quebec delegates said it was always the policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to champion the cause of the common people, and he went to defeat upon the reciprocity pact, but the people of Canada were now awake to the mistake they made in 1911. There was no east nor west in the Liberal party, but a united Canada, and the man who attempted to cause religious and racial divisions should be damned to perdition. One Quebec speaker had three sons who fought side by side with Ontario boys in France, and he made an eloquent and stirring appeal for unity for the happiness and welfare of Canada. Ernest Lapointe, M.P., Sir Lomer Gouin, Hon. Jacques Bureau, Hon. Rodolph Lemieux, Hon. Joseph Beaudry, and Hon. Mr. Vinot received thunderous applause. Quebec will vote solidly for an English-speaking leader, who will be chosen to-day.

RUSHING THE ROAD PAVING

MONTREAL STREET TO BE COMPLETED NEXT WEEK.

Princess Street May Be Finished by September 1st—The City Should Buy a Tractor Engine.

Ald. Graham, chairman of the Board of Works, states that the work of paving Montreal street from James street to the outer station, will be completed within ten days, and that he expects the paving of Princess street from Barrie to Alfred street to be finished by the first of September. After that work will be carried on Stuart street, which should be finished before frost time if there is not too much rainy weather.

Owing to inability of getting road paving material, principally crushed stone, the Board of Works has been unable to utilize two shifts of men as proposed some time ago in order to get more streets paved this year. In view of the fact that the city will be kept busy for the next ten years at road building, it is claimed that it would pay the Board of Works to purchase a tractor engine for the scarifier which has been brought forth after some years of inactivity. The reason given for not using the scarifier on the roads each year is that a tractor cannot be secured. One can be purchased for under \$2,000 and the city should own one.
